President's Report

G'day all and how's things.

Firstly, I would like to say a very large thank you to all of our fantastic volunteers, ranging across all gambits of the club. Be it, the Executive, Nippers Canteen, Patrolling Members, the masters of the beer pulling, Emergency Call Out Crews and so on and so forth each and every one of you make this club what it is. I cannot say thank you enough.

As everyone knows this was my first year as President and it was a role that made me incredibly proud and humble. I could not have managed the many facets of our club without the invaluable help provided in particular by those on the Executive Committee. Legends all.

The patrolling season was a very busy one. Our Club Captain Karl WEBER was sensational this year in formulating the patrols and ensuring that our beach met all Surf Lifesaving requirements. It was a busy year with over 46000 visitors to our beach, with 83 rescues being performed and over 2500 preventative actions. The Patrols are the reason surf lifesaving does what it does, without the volunteers who give up their Saturdays and Sundays many of these 46000 visitors may not of gone home.

All of our volunteer patrol members as well as other members of the club involved in Nippers, Emergency Call outs etc are all qualified. They would not be if it wasn't for our education team run by Chief Training Officer Russ TAUNTON. Russ had a bit of a spring clean when he took over the helm and he did an amazing job. Many thanks to him and his team.

Our patrolling members all start out as Nippers and what a year our young seagulls and galls have had. Run fantastically by Justin LARKIN and the Junior Committee. The skills that our youngsters are demonstrating is testament to the Age Managers and Water Safety that help out every week. Our 14's successfully completed their SRC and are now active patrolling members, so good. We had many of them compete at local, branch and state carnivals with success and smiles.

The Powercraft Team goes from strength to strength under the guidance of Anthony ASHLEY and co. The Powercraft Team forms a large part of our emergency call out team and have responded to incidents in surf and during the 2022/23 flood emergency. In competition they have brought home some fantastic results including NSW State Champions in one event.

The mighty sea eels continue to dip their budgie smuggler clad bodies into the cold water and continue to raise funds for charity. Led in all categories (swimming and socialising) by Mr MaC they are a great bunch of people.

Our boat crew has been led by Ed WHITE and they have been training up a storm with the aim of competing at the World Championships next year. Watch this space.

Financially we are sitting in a pretty good spot, and we will continue to apply for grants and to fundraise to provide the amenities and services that our community deserve.

Our mission to have the surf club modernised and revamped is ongoing. Things are moving along however things do tend to get log jammed at council. Regular updates on the club development are located on the club website within the Minutes of each executive meeting.

One of the main goals for the new executive was to engage more with our local community. We have done this by re-introducing our Friday Night Drinks that also support a local charity. It has been awesome to see so many locals hanging out at the club over the course of the summer.

So in finishing, Thank you again. Without the team of volunteers and our community Helensburgh Stanwell-Park Surf Club would not be in the shape it is today. I would particularly like to thank our Vice President Mat WHITE for stepping in on so many occasions when I was unavailable.

Club Captain's Report

During the 2022 / 23 season, the club's combined total patrol hours amounted to 3570 hours. During the season we successfully ran 6 separate patrols who took responsibility for safety on Stanwell Park Beach. I would like to pass on my respect and thanks to all involved, both on the beach, and within the families of our volunteers. As they say, it takes a village to raise a child, but a strong community to keep our beaches safe. Overall, we had a successful season, with unprecedented numbers starting to flow to our coast during the warmer days.

- Across our 8 months of patrolling, more than 85% of patrols were classified as being fine in terms of weather.
- Stanwell Park beach was officially closed for only 10 times across the season.
 Reasons for closure included dangerous surf, electrical storms & shark sightings.
- Crowd estimates were over 46,000 visitors to Stanwell Park beach during the season.
- 2022/23 season total rescues tally were listed as 68 rescues. There are estimates that there should be at least another 15

- rescues added to this tally, but there was a technical issue recording over the Christmas break.
- This is a significant tally as the Illawarra Branch listed a total 404 rescues for the entire region over the season. This would mean HSPSLSC made at least 20% of the rescues for the region.
- The majority of these rescues took place in the afternoon between 1 pm, and the end of Patrol. Over 80% of those rescued were male.
- Another significant statistic is that members completed over 2500 preventative actions during the season, thus avoiding a significant increase in rescues.
- In terms of first aid support, there were 25 first aid responses made by patrolling members. More than half of these being for minute cuts & abrasions. Two of these incidents required ambulance support with one incident requiring helicopter and ICU hospitalisation.

Emergency Callout Team

- Figure 8 Pool

The Emergency Callout team started the season with an unusual Emergency Call Out.

Just off the coast of the Royal National Park close to the famous *Figure 8 Pool* a large shipping container had lost power and was moving dangerously close to the cliff face.

The Emergency Call out team was put on standby as a precaution if any rescuing was required in the event of the ship crashing against the cliffs. Luckily this was not the case, and the team was stood down. Although some of the members would have loved the opportunity to test their skills out in such a strange scenario.

A few weeks later a call came to help a bushwalker that had injured themself at Figure 8 pool and required to be air lifted out. Several members launched the IRBs and headed up to help as required. As they arrived the Coalcliff Jet Ski was on site along with a first aid support crew. After examination it was decided to air lift the bushwalker out.

Figure 8 Pool became a regular callout for the Emergency Team with IRBs being sent several times over the course of the season. Gladly I can report no injuries were recorded with just some minor scratches and bruised egos.

A very scary moment appeared closer to Christmas when a lost Surfer went missing for several hours off the Clifton Coast with multiple IRBs called on from several clubs including our own. But just as the IRBs were ready to launch the surfer was found walking out of the water safe completely oblivious to the chaos he had caused.

Over the coming months the team was called on to help with lost surfers, fishermen and injured tourist only to be stood down at the last minute. It was always great to that no matter what the issue was members were always willing to offer help and jump into action.

NSW Floods

With the NSW floods still running rampant across the State a call came out to help in far West NSW for anyone who could help.

Several of our members offered to go at different times but never dispatched until Mat Webber was called on and was sent to Brewarrina. Located around 2hrs drive from Lightning Ridge Mat was a long way from home and the Ocean.

As Mat soon found out the only way to get in or out of the area was via air. Once landing on a dusty runway in a small 2 propeller light aircraft, Mat was quickly put to work helping stranded people up and down the swollen rivers. After several nights Mat was finally sent home but could see how desperate the community needed more help. After a few weeks Mat put his hand up again to go back and help out wherever required and was asked to go to Wentworth in early March but the water began to dry out and he was not required.

This was a real test of character for Mat and the selflessness he gave to help others in need especially so far from home. This certainly did not deter Mat in anyway as he has since then taken part in further training in Western Sydney with the SES and other SLSNSW members in a training course call "Land Based Swift Water Rescue" which is part of a group called the F.R.G. "Flood Response Group"

I know I speak for everyone when I say how proud we are of your efforts Mat. It is inspiring to see you give so much of your time to help others.

Every single one of the Emergency Call Out members have offered their own time to help others. I am so proud of each and every one of you. Thank you so much for all that you have done this season, it may feel that you did not achieve much but the fact you were there ready to do whatever it takes is a true test of Helensburgh -Stanwell Park IRB and Surf Club culture Thank you from all of us.

IRB Racing

The Sea Wolves 2022 season was full of excitement and celebration. The 14-member competing team hit the beach at full speed, along with 3 team managers and 2 officials. In total the Sea Wolves squad was 19 people strong.

This has been the most successful season to date with the team coming home from the regular season with the Rookies bringing home the silver medal in Mass Rescue and Bronze medal Surf Rescue.

The Sea Wolves backed this effort up at the State Championships with the Rookies winning the first ever GOLD medal at State Championships for the Helensburgh – Stanwell Park IRB Racing team. The team also won 2 Silver medals and 2 Bronze in the Rookies and 35 + divisions.

The Sea Wolves have recorded some amazing results. This is all credit to the ongoing hard work and commitment to all members of the Sea Wolves IRB Racing team.

A special mention to the Sea Wolves Team managers *Kat Dabrowski*, *Roman Dabrowski* and *Anne Mithieux*. The Racing team would not be able to function without the ongoing help, dedication, and patients you all have for our competitors. Treasurer's Report

The Year in Review: a surplus of \$16,893 was recorded for the 2022-2023 year after factoring in depreciation expenses of \$33,457

Income: \$191,416 a decrease of \$34,729 compared to the 2021-2022 year, with decrease income from donations and sponsorship, grants and fundraising activities. This decrease was offset by an increase in sales income and carnivals fees

Expenditure: \$174,524 a decrease of \$82,072 compared to the 2021-2022 year, with decrease in building fund and project expenses and an increase by \$33,364 in the cost of goods sold

- \$30,069 was received from Donations , sponsorship and fundraising activities compared to \$62,866 in the previous year
- \$21,973 was received from grants compared to \$40,674 in the previous year
- \$81,463 was received from sales compared to \$40,824. This was due to the end of Covid restriction and life going back to normal

Financial Position

At 31 March 2023, cash at bank (operating accounts) was \$57,538 compared to \$75,921 the previous year.

A contingency amount of \$21,000 was invested in a Term Deposit to cover damage to the club building up to \$20,000 for which the Club is liable under the terms of the building lease.

\$70,000 was invested in a Term Deposit to be used for the Building Extensions.

Another \$60,000 was invested in another Term Deposit to cover any additional expenses. At 31 March 2023, the Club was not in debt to any supplier (other than within 30 day trading terms.

Governance and Club Management

The Club is an Incorporated Association established under the provisions of the *Associations Incorporations Act* (NSW) 2009.

The Club Constitution and By Laws were updated and approved by members at the 2020 Annual General Meeting. It is intended to further update the Constitution in the coming year to bring it in line with the latest SLSA and SLSNSW Constitutions. On completion, a Special General Meeting of members will be convened to adopt the revised Constitution.

Executive Committee

As defined in the Constitution, the Club's affairs are controlled by the Executive Committee of eight elected officers. Sub-committees including the Lifesaving Committee, Education Committee, Junior Activities Committee, Surf Sports Committee and Winter Swim Committee all reporting to the Executive Committee.

Special General Meetings

A Special General Meeting to elect the Junior Activities Committee and officers for the 2023-2024 season was held 26.03.2023.

Junior Activities Committee

The Junior Activities Committee dealt with day-to-day matters autonomously and held regular meetings during 2022-2023 season.

Stanwell Park Sea Eels

The Annual General Meeting and election of officers for the 2022 season took place on 01.05.2022

Objects of the Club

The Objects of the Club are to:

- (a) Provide for the conduct, encouragement, promotion and administration of surf lifesaving;
- (b) Participate as a Member of Surf Life Saving Illawarra, Surf Life Saving New South Wales and Surf Life Saving Australia through and by which surf lifesaving and the preservation of life in the aquatic environment can be conducted, encouraged, promoted, advanced and administered:
- (c) At all times act on behalf of and in the interest of the Members and surf lifesaving;

- (d) Affiliate with and otherwise liaise with SLSI, SLSNSW and SLSA in the pursuit of these Objects and surf lifesaving;
- (e) Promote the involvement and influence of surf lifesaving standards, techniques, awards and education with bodies involved in lifesaving;
- (f) Prepare junior members for admittance as surf lifesavers;
- (g) Promote competition at Club and interclub level for junior and senior members;
- (h) Review and/or determine any matters relating to surf lifesaving which may arise, or be referred to it, by any Member;
- (i) Pursue through itself or other such commercial arrangements (which are not in conflict with other SLS bodies), including sponsorship and marketing opportunities as are appropriate to further the interests of surf lifesaving;
- (j) Represent the interests of its Members and of surf lifesaving generally in any appropriate forum;
- (k) Have regard to the public interest in its operations;
- (l) Undertake and/or do all such things or activities which are necessary, incidental or conducive to the advancement of these Objects.

Affiliation with SLSA

Members at the Annual General Meeting on 21.08.2022 resolved to apply for continuing affiliation with Surf Life Saving Australia for the 2022-23 year.

Audit of Accounts 2022-23

The accounts were audited by Paul Mattock of Evolve Small Business Accounting. The Financial Statements and Auditors Report are reprinted towards the end of this Annual Report

Financial Reporting 2021-22 year

The Financial Statements for year ending 31.03.2022 including Auditors Report, were published as part of the Club's 2021-22 Annual Report.

The Annual Information Statement for the 2021-22 financial year was lodged on-line with ACNC on 04.09.2022.

Charitable Fundraising

As required by the *Charitable Fundraising Act* 1991, the Club is required to submit an audited Financial Report covering its operations each year, together with a signed declaration of compliance with the Act.

This obligation was met by forwarding a copy of the audited Financial Statements to Surf Life Saving NSW, which holds the 'Authority to Fundraise' on behalf of all NSW surf clubs. The Financial Statements were submitted during September 2022

GST reporting

Business Activity Statements were submitted to the Australian Taxation Office at the end of each quarter, the last Statement being submitted for quarter ending 31.03.2023.

Insurance

Surf Life Saving Australia has arranged public liability and property loss and damage for all surf life saving clubs through Marsh Insurance.

The insurance proposal was completed and submitted on 23.08.2022, for policies covering loss or damage to assets valid to 01.10.2023. Public Liability Insurance (\$50 million), is also in place and valid to 07.10.2023.

Members continue to be covered for medical expenses incurred due to injuries whilst involved in an approved surf club activity through the NSW Government scheme for volunteer workers.

Working with Children Checks

The Executive Committee continues to ensure Club officers and members who, as part of their Club activities become associated with members under the age of 18 years, have a current Working with Children clearance.

This is undertaken by following SLSNSW guidelines, as well as meeting the requirements of the *Child Protection (Working with Children) Act* 2012, and *Child Protection (Working with Children) Regulation*, 2013.

At 30 June 2023, 22 members were recorded with a current WWCC clearance.

To comply with new legislative requirements regarding child safety, the Executive Committee has decided to select and appoint Club members as the Child Safe Co-ordinator and Complaints Officer.

Environmental management

Continual oversight of Club activities is undertaken by Executive Committee members to minimise environmental risks from spills whilst refuelling IRBs and ATVs within the boat shed and paved outdoor area. Similar to previous years, the risk was mitigated by having two spill kits located in the boat shed, and briefing of IRB crews and patrol members on their duty of care.

Liquor Licence

The Club continues to hold an On-Premises Liquor Licence for Stanwell Park Surf Club (LIQO 660031060). Harley Dreghorn is the Licence Manager, appointed from 06.09.2017.

In accordance with the Licence Conditions, the Club continues to be a member of the Wollongong LGA Liquor Accord, with the Licence Manager attending quarterly meetings.

Only one incident relating to the Liquor Licence was recorded during the year.

Motor Vehicle Registration

Motor vehicle registration is current for three surf boat trailers, gear trailer and one ATV, with the second ATV deregistered pending its trade in on a new unit.

Membership overview

Total membership was 408 compared to 403 in 2021-22 year.

Membership Registrations

On-line member renewal and new registrations were again promoted this year, in an endeavour to minimise the workload on our Registrars

The majority of our members also assisted the clerical effort with prompt payment of membership fees through either the SLSA On-line payment facility or by direct deposit to the Club's bank account.

Notes to the Financial Statements

Helensburgh-Stanwell Park Surf Life Saving Club Inc is an Association incorporated in New South Wales in 1995 under the provisions of the Associations Incorporation Act (NSW) 2009. The Executive Committee consisting of the following members at the date of this report, is the governing body of the Association:

The Association is a not-for-profit organisation operating as a surf life saving club and emergency service organisation in the Stanwell Park district.

1 Basis of preparation

The Executive Committee has determined that the Association is not a reporting entity and this report has accordingly been prepared as a Special Purpose Financial Statement, covering all operations and activities of the Association as an individual entity for the 12 months ended 31 March 2023.

The Financial Statements were prepared to meet the reporting requirements of the *Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act* (Cth) 2012, as well as the *Charitable Fundraising Act* (NSW) 1991 and *Associations Incorporation Act* (NSW) 2009, and associated Regulations, and also to meet the requirements of the members of Helensburgh-Stanwell Park Surf Life Saving Club Inc.

The Financial Statements were prepared in accordance with various Australian Accounting Standards and Accounting Interpretations, and on an accruals basis, based on historical costs, modified where applicable by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

Estimates and judgements included in these Financial Statements are based on the Association's actual income and expenditure over the past two years and other known factors as well as proposed activities and projected budgets for the forthcoming financial year.

The following accounting standards relevant to charitable organisations and not-for-profit entities, apply:

- AASB 13: Fair value of Leases
- AASB 15: Revenue from Contracts with Customers
- AASB 16: Leases
- AASB 101: Presentation of Financial Statements
- AASB 107: Statement of Cash Flows
- AASB 108: Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors
- AASB 116: Property, Plant and Equipment
- AASB 137: Provisions, Contingent Liabilities and Contingent Assets
- AASB 1048: Interpretation of Standards
- AASB 1054: Australian Additional Disclosures
- AASB 1058: Income of Not-for-Profit entities

The application of these Standards has not resulted in any material changes to the Association's financial position, performance, or cash flow.

Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Revenue and other income

Other than as stated below, revenue is recognised when the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably, and it is probable that the economic benefit will flow to the Association.

(b) Sale of goods

Revenue is recognised at the time of transfer of goods to the customer when the risks and rewards are transferred and the Association no longer has ownership or control.

(c) Private Functions and Community Events

The 5-step process noted in AASB 15 is applied with revenue from private functions and community events recognised at the conclusion of the event when the Association can identify it has met its contractual obligations of providing an agreed service to a customer.

(d) Membership and related fees

Revenue from membership fees and other membership charges are recognised at the time of receipt, other than fees or charges received in advance for a subsequent membership year when the revenue is carried forward on the Balance Sheet.

(e) Donations and Sponsorship

Revenue is recognised in the Income and Expenditure Statement when received, unless designated for a special purpose or is subject to conditions, in which case revenue is recognised as a liability and carried forward on the Balance Sheet until used for the designated purpose or the conditions have been met.

(f) Grants

Grant revenue is recognised in the Income and Expenditure Statement when the Association obtains control of the grant funds, it is probable that the economic benefits gained will flow to the Association and the grant can be measured reliably.

When a grant is subject to conditions such as a designated use, time frame for completion, and/or acquittal obligations, revenue is recognised as a liability and carried forward on the Balance Sheet until such time as the conditions have been met.

Grants received to acquire or renew plant and equipment assets on a \$ for \$ basis or a nominal amount, are recognised as an addition to plant and equipment values on the Balance Sheet at fair value equal to their usual selling price at the date of acquisition. When this occurs, a corresponding amount of income comprising either grant funding or a donation amount, is recognised in the Income and Expenditure Statement.

Grants received to undertake leasehold works to the Club building are recognised as income in the Income and Expenditure Statement with the cost of asset improvement works carried as a property asset on the Balance Sheet.

(g) Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

(h) Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value, less where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment.

(i) Depreciation

Plant and equipment is depreciated on a reducing balance basis over the assets useful life to the Association, commencing from when the asset is first acquired.

Assets used for lifesaving, member training and development, and competition are depreciated at 20% over five years on a straight-line basis, whilst furniture, fittings and assets in use in the office, main hall, bar, kitchen and amenities, are depreciated at 15% over seven years on a straight-line basis.

The value of improvements to the leased premises occupied by the Association and completed in 2019, are depreciated at 15% over seven years on a straight-line basis.

All categories of plant and equipment acquired at a cost of less than \$3,000 are fully depreciated during the financial year of acquisition.

Assets acquired at a cost of less than \$1,000 are not capitalised, and are included as an expense in the Income and Expenditure Statement.

The Executive Committee reviews the depreciation methodology, useful life criteria and residual value of assets annually and introduces adjustments as required.

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(j) Leases

The Association leases the Surf Club premises at Stanwell Park from Wollongong City Council at a peppercorn rental with right-of-use to occupy the premises for the sole purpose of furthering its Objectives as a surf life saving club. The Association has no other leases in place either financial or operational.

The Executive Committee has considered the implications of AASB 16 - Leases, AASB 13 - Fair Value of Leases, and AASB 2018-8 - Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards – Right-of-Use Assets of Not-for-Profit entities in relation to the Association's occupation of the Club premises as a lessee.

After review of the accounting standards, the Executive Committee has determined:

- the building lease is not classified as an operating or finance lease,
- the lease grants right-of-use to the Association solely for surf life saving operations and activities,
- the lease provides significantly below-market terms and conditions, and
- the below-market terms and conditions are primarily allowed by the Lessor to enable the Association to further its Objectives as a surf life saving club.

The accounting standards allow not-for-profit entities having right-of-use of leased premises and where the terms and conditions are below-market, to elect to measure the value of a lease at its initial recognition at cost, subject to disclosure of additional qualitative and quantitative information about the lease.

The Association has therefore elected to adopt this measure, and provides the following information about the building lease:

• Leased Premises: Helensburgh-Stanwell Park Surf Life Saving Club building

1 Beach Road, Stanwell Park, NSW 2508

Lessor: Wollongong City Council

Right-of-Use: The Association has exclusive rights to occupy and use the building for surf life saving

operations and activities, other than the Council Lifeguards amenities room and

equipment storage shed.

• Lease start date: 1 November 2018

Term of lease: 21 years, expiring on 31 October 2039

• Lease payments: First year (2018-2019) - \$690.00 (incl GST) payable in advance.

Rental in subsequent years is varied annually according to Wollongong City Council's

Community and Sporting Group annual rental charges.

• Payments to date: \$3,570 (incl GST) paid from 1 November 2018 to 31 October 2022.

• Value of lease: Over the first three years, annual rental has increased by approx 2.1%pa.to \$720 (incl

GST). Assessed on a similar rate over the 21 year term, the total value of the lease is

approximately \$15,790 (incl GST)

• Lease conditions: Summary (relevant conditions only).

The Premises may only be used for surf life saving operations and activities, including activities associated with raising funds to further the Objectives of the Association. The Association as lessee is responsible for maintaining the interior of the Premises in good condition, and repairing any damage to the Premises up to a value of \$20,000.

3 Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

No amount has been allocated for Provisions in the reporting period

Comparative Figures

This report is for the 12 month period commencing 1 April 2022 and ending 31 March 2023, with comparative figures for the 12 months ended 31 March 2022.

Income Tax

The Association is an Exempt Entity as defined in Section 50-5 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act* (Cth), 1997, as a charitable organisation registered with Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission.

Goods and Services Tax

Transactions are recognised net of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST receivable from, or payable to, the ATO, is included with other receivables or payables in the balance sheet.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held on call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts.

8Building Fund Term Deposits

Funds held in Building Fund Term Deposits have been raised for and are allocated to future extensions and upgrading of the Club building.

Building Lease Contingency Fund

A condition of the lease of Helensburgh-Stanwell Park Surf Club building from Wollongong City Council obligates the Association to make good at its cost minor damage up to an amount of \$20,000. The Association has accordingly set aside an amount of \$20,000 to meet this obligation should damage occur.

In accordance with AASB 137 – Provisions, the Association does not treat this as a Liability or Provision as there is no current obligation for an outflow of benefits as a result of a past event, the amount of any outflow of benefits cannot be reliably estimated, the timing of an event is unknown, and the probability is low.

Prepayments

Prepayments represent expenses paid by the Association for goods or services acquired during the reporting period intended for use in a subsequent reporting period, and are recognised as a financial asset.

Trade and Other Receivables

Trade and other receivables represent income due to the Association, but not received at the end of the reporting period. Receivables are recognised as a financial asset in the current reporting period

Inventories

Inventories are carried at the lower of cost or net realisable value. Cost is based on the first-in, first-out method and includes expenditure incurred in acquiring the inventories and bringing them to the existing condition and location.

Property, Plant and Equipment

(a) Land and Buildings

The Association does not own any real property.

The Association leases the surf club building at 1 Beach Road, Stanwell Park from Wollongong City Council with the lease expiring in 2039. Refer Note 2(j) for details about treatment of the value of the lease as an asset.

Leasehold improvements to the building completed during the 2019-20 year are depreciated annually on a straight-line basis over seven years as reported below.

The Association owns two shipping containers (with no residual asset value) used for storage of equipment, located on privately owned property at 225 Parkes Street, Helensburgh at nil rental under a reciprocal arrangement with the property owner.

During the 2020-21 year, the Association initiated a project to upgrade the surf club building to current accessibility standards and engaged consultants to prepare a Development Application. Consultants fees are included in the Income and Expenditure Statement as this work has no direct impact on the current value of any land or buildings. Funds for payment of consultant's fees were drawn from the Building Fund.

(b) Plant and Equipment

Assets acquired at a cost of \$3,000 or more and used for lifesaving and beach patrols, member training and competition are depreciated annually based on their estimated useful life and service reliability, with depreciation calculated on a straight-line basis over five years. Furniture and fittings and all other assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over seven years.

Assets acquired with a value of less than \$3,000 are fully depreciated in the financial year of acquisition.

Trade Creditors

Trade Creditors represent a liability for goods and services included on a Purchase Order placed with a supplier during the reporting period, but unpaid at the end of the reporting period.

Other Current Payables

Other payables represent a liability for goods and services ordered or supplied during the reporting period, but unpaid at the end of the reporting period.

21 Related Party Transactions

Nil.

Key Management Personnel

Members including key management personnel and volunteers are not compensated for their work.

Segment reporting

The Association provides surf life saving services to the community for the Stanwell Park district.

Revenue Recognition

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised upon the delivery of goods to customers.

Revenue from the rendering of services is recognised upon the delivery of the services to customers. Revenue from commissions is recognised upon delivery of services to customers.

Revenue from interest is recognised using the effective interest rate method.

Revenue from dividends is recognised when the entity has a right to receive the dividend.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

Leases

Finance leases are leases of fixed assets where substantially all of the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset are transferred to the entity, but the legal ownership is not transferred to the entity. Finance leases are capitalised by recording an asset and a corresponding liability at the lower of the amounts equal to the fair value of the leased asset, or the minimum lease payments measured at present value including any residual values.

Leased assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of their estimated useful lives or the lease term. Operating lease payments are charged to the income statement on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease. Lease incentives are deferred and amortised over the period of the lease.

Profits and losses on sale and leaseback transactions are recognised in the reporting period in which they occur.

Financial Risk Management

The Association's financial instruments consist primarily of deposits with banks, including short term investments, and accounts receivable and payable. The Association does not have any derivative instruments at 31.03.2023.

Association Details

The principal place of business of the Association is Helensburgh-Stanwell Park Surf Club premises, 1 Beach Road, Stanwell Park, NSW 2508

Going concern

The Association recorded a surplus of \$16,893 this financial year. Cash flow is positive with \$59,552 held at the end of the reporting period, and a further \$151,000 invested in the Term Deposits of which \$91,000 are allocated to the building fund.

The Asset Renewal program supported by local businesses and Government grants, ensures our lifesaving and member development assets are renewed on a regular basis, whilst the Club's strategy of linking member subscriptions to utilities, insurances, building management and other general expenses associated with operating as an incorporated association, provides an on-going income source.

The Executive Committee through development and monitoring of cash flows and budgets, is confident that the Association can continue to meet its obligations to pay accounts as and when they fall due.

The current project to upgrade the Club premises is not intended to affect the operating income and will only proceed after the Association has secured funding from other sources.

Changes in operations and activities

The Executive Committee is unaware of any significant changes to its operations and other activities that may impact the Association's ability to continue as a going concern
