- Combined presentation afternoon and patrol dinner into one big formal event for better recognition of excellence
- The club christened the new IRB hull the "2508"
- > Continued financial support from government and the community enable the Club to update its rescue equipment
- The Club achieved its best ever result at the NSW coming 6th and at the Australian Titles we came 22nd

To all members of Helensburgh-Stanwell Park SLSC

This report is to highlight the achievements and conduct of Helensburgh-Stanwell Park Surf Life Saving Club in its 108^{th} season of serving the public and providing a safe environment for the public to use Stanwell Park Beach, training life savers, competing at surf carnivals and providing a breeding ground for future life savers.

The season was a year of change for the club, with grassroots initiatives transforming Nippers Pointscore, and the Annual Presentation function and the Patrol Members Dinner.

The past few seasons had seen a big drop off in the number of members attending the Patrol Dinner and the Annual Presentation function, with members attending one or the other but not both. Change was needed and there was a push from members to hold a function that celebrated the club's competition, patrolling and education achievements in one special event. The Helensburgh-Stanwell Park Surf Life Saving Club Awards of Excellence Night was the result. The event even resulted in the renaming of club awards to line up with Branch, State and Australian Awards of Excellence criteria.

The night combined the former Patrol Dinner night and Presentation afternoon into one event. What a Night!!!

During the planning phase the committee hoped that 150 people would attend, thinking it would get 100, but the event sold out and then some with the final figure being 174 attendees....an awesome result, and it was a fabulous evening. Congratulations to everyone who received an award and good luck at the Illawarra Awards of Excellence and beyond. Thank you to all the club members, family members and friends who turned up to make the event what it was.

Nippers Pointscore has for a long time been Beach and Water Events, and when the weather was off Education. The Junior Committee instigated a change to have 4 session each week consisting of Surf Skills, Water, Beach and Education. Surf Skills aimed at getting the Nippers into the water in a non-competitive environment and having become more familiar with the surf. The addition of the weekly Education session was to have a structured approach to the Nippers gaining their various Surf

Awareness Awards instead of the ad-hoc sessions in previous years.

From all reports the nippers, parents and committee are more than happy with the new program and will be running it again next season. Congratulations to the Junior Committee for this initiative, and they were duly recognised by being awarded Initiative of the Year.

In a season that saw more than 30,000 people attend Stanwell Park Beach, the more than 130 life savers who signed onto a patrol during the season can proudly boast that they contributed to another season with "No Lives Lost" during patrolling hours on Stanwell Park Beach. Aaron Abela in his second season as Club Captain, supported by Patrol Secretary Peter McDonald managed the clubs 8 patrols and active reserve members. With more than 30 members achieving 100% Patrol Attendance shows the dedication of the clubs life savers.

Patrols were boosted this season by some new equipment. The long awaited for Patrol Trailer. No longer do patrol members need to hand carry the growing list of equipment down onto the beach to setup patrol. The Patrol Trailer contains Rescue Boards, Tubes, First Aid Kit, Air Bag, Defibrillator, Spinal Board, Signal Flags, and Patrol Flags. The side folds up to provide shade and there is a 3m long bench seat for patrol members to sit and observe the beach. Funds for the Patrol Trailer were donated by Tradies Helensburgh, we thank them very much for their support.

President's Report

The "2508" IRB was launched during the season, named "2508" in recognition of the tremendous community support that the club has received over many years. The launch was attended by many life members, club members and representatives from the local communities, including State Member for Heathcote Lee Evans, Helensburgh Rural Fire Service Captain Aaron West, Anne-Maree Connelly from Helensburgh Public School, Lynn Bedwell from Stanwell Park Public School and Tradies Director Philip Bowering. It was good to see so many people come to witness an on-going traditional of rolling the IRB on launch day.

Kristina Ridley was recognised as the club's Life Saver of the Year for her ongoing dedication to patrolling Stanwell Park Beach. She is an active member of patrol, always at the water's edge, has a great repport with the local community, encourages younger patrol members to patrol more actively and says that she is doing patrols just to put back into the community. Kristina also is part of the Stanwell Park Ocean Challenge Committee, and has been able to encourage other community members to engage in the organising of the event. She is never afraid to get in and have a go.

Ryan Van Zyl was awarded Junior Life Saver of the Year. Ryan is a strong contributor to every patrol he attends, and his board paddling and swimming strength are vital to a patrol. He is consistently on the water's edge actively patroling. He is always on hand to help out with Water Safety, training Surf Rescue Certificates candidates, IRB Crewing, and all facets of club life.

The club is fortunate to have two such fine life savers patrolling Stanwell Park Beach. Of course there are many other fine members of the club who contribute to both patrols and club life, and their efforts are recognised and valued by the club and the community. The club thanks all members who signed onto a patrol this season for their contribution and dedication.

This season is the end of the current Life Saving Agreement between the club and Surf Life Saving NSW. The agreement currently mandates that patrols are performed on Saturday and Sunday. The Saturday requirement is being challenged by not only the club, but also Surf Life Saving Illawarra and the associated clubs.

The club's position being that with Wollongong City Council Lifeguards on-duty, there is not much of a role for the club's Lifesavers, and club would prefer to put all of its efforts into successfully patrolling the beach on Sundays only. At most the club agrees that during the peak period of the summer school holidays Life Savers could provide some assistance to the Lifeguards.

The club appreciates the lifesavers that patrolled on Saturdays during the season, and also for the input they provided during negotiations with SLSNSW and SLSI. When the new Life Saving Agreement is signed for the 2015/2016 Season and beyond let's hope that the Saturday requirement is greatly reduced, if not removed all together.

Competition is a vital part of club life, it is thru competition that life savers train and hone their skills for patrol.... Our club is fortunate to have two outstanding members who are driving both boat and beach competition. Thankyou to Mark "Bluey" Lea and Daniel Robberds for the contribution you are both making to the club, it is not only the training of these club members for competition, but you are building on the clubs lifesaving strength. Each of these members complete a minimum number of patrol hours and are strong contributors to the clubs patrolling activities.

The drive of the competitors and their coaches is continuing to produce unbelievable results at all levels of competition. At the Australian Championship 2 Gold Medals with the U/15 Male Beach Relay Team of Brent Manning, Adam Newey, Kyle Attard and Brock Scrivener, and the U/17 Female Beach Relay Team of Yvette Avery, Avalon Punch, Kate Lewis and Ella Saberton.

At the NSW Championships the club improved its 2014 position of 7th overall to 6th overall, in front of every NSW club south from Cronulla, an outstanding result for a relatively small team. In the boats the Open Female Boat Crew of Stephanie Barlow, Brooke Dent, Georgia Leach, Courtney Overell and Mark "Bluey" Lea picked up Gold. On the beach there was a tsunami of Gold with Keeliegh McCauley U/19 Female Beach Flags, Daniel McKellar U/19 Male Beach Sprint, U/17 Female Beach Relay, U/19 Female Beach Relay, Open Female Beach Relay, and Yvette Avery U/17 Female Beach Sprint. In the NSW Age Championship there was Gold for Adam Newey U/14 Male Beach Sprint and Brock Scrivener U/14 Male Beach Flags.

Well done to all club members who represented Helensburgh-Stanwell Park at any level of competition, keep up that "Park" spirit.



The club would not be able to patrol or compete without a dedicated team of trainers and assessors. Led by Chief Training Officer Bobo White, the "Education Team" trained 19 Surf Rescue Certificates, 16 Bronze Medallions, 8 Advance Resuscitation Techniques Certificates, 5 Silver Medallion IRB Drivers, 4 IRB Crew Persons, 15 Radio Controller Certificates, and 114 Junior Surf Awareness Awards.

The efforts of this team has left the club in terms of qualification in a better position than it started the season. Having 5 additional IRB Drivers reduces the load on the club's existing drivers, these members are vital to maintain the club's patrol strength. Along with awards training, the team ensured all patrol members completed their annual proficiency requirements, ran community education programs, assessed members of other clubs, attended training sessions to improve their own skills and attended a number of club and branch education meetings

The team put in many hours not only on the beach, but behind the scenes as there is a tremendous amount of compliance and paperwork that needs to be done to ensure that each member gains their award. Thanks to the following members for their efforts Ralph Hall, Iris Huizinga, Klaus Liss, Gary Marshall, Peter McDonald, Stephanie McGuinness, Natalie Manley, Amy-Leigh Perrin, Geoff Ryder, Peter Tuner, Russ White and Ryan Van Zyl.

Peter Turner was recognised by the club as Educator of the Year for his on-going support training club members, he also upgraded his awards including completing his Certificate IV and becoming an ARTC assessor. He oversaw the club's ARTC training program for the season, and ran a Surf Awareness program at Gulgong High School. Given that Peter lives about 40 minutes from Stanwell Park, he has put in a huge effort this season.

The Stanwell Park Ocean Challenge was ran in challenging conditions this season after being cancelled the previous season due to very unfavourable conditions. The event was run by a new committee with oversight from long term organiser Andrew Perrin. The new committee comprising of club members and local community

members pulled together towards the end of 2014. They approached the event with enthusiasm and professionalism, and shone some new light on the event with the aim of making the swim a community and social event. Unfortunately the weather conspired against the committee and put a dampener on the planned post swim activities.

The challenging sea conditions required the club to beef up its water safety, which included all 3 IRB's, many rescue boards, tube swimmers on the shore, and the support of Surf Life Saving Illawarra Jet Ski's. Fortunately all swimmers made it back to Stanwell Park, but it was a tough swim with an inconsistent swell making it difficult for swimmers to maintain a good rhythm. It didn't upset the elite athletes who powered thru the swell finishing in just over 30 minutes, but the achievements of the day were left to the final swimmers to complete the course including Georgene Mckenzie-Hick aged 80 and a bit.

Well done to the swimmers, and the new organising committee for your efforts. Thanks to Andrew Perrin who is still trying to retire from the committee for your continued support of the event.

The Annual Life Savers Appeals Day saw the "2508" community stick its collective hand in its pocket and donate \$3,690. This was a good effort given the low turnout from club members with only 34 members assisting with the collection. Thanks to everyone who assisted, including those who doubled up and did the Friday Night and Saturday Morning.

There are many ways you could look at this, on the positive side it works out that each member collected \$100....so if we extend that to say adding every competitor this season the potential would be \$8,500 or every member that signed onto a patrol the potential would be \$13,400...that would be an achievement. On the negative side the club is just one of many organisations putting its hand out for a donation from the "2508" community, and the club is grateful for the support it currently receives and has received over the years.



President's Report

The club continued hosting Friday Night Drinks, starting later in the season and finishing up early than in previous years. When the weather was great it was well attended by members and locals, but when the weather was unfavourable it was tough going. Thanks to those members of each of the club groups who supported Friday Night Drinks, any funds raised from the sale of food going to The Seagulls, The Sea Eels, The Boaties and The Beachies. The plan is to continue into next season, but we will review frequency and timing to ensure that the club is getting the most out of the initiative.

Clubs do not function without hard working members, and this season the club recognised Carl Williams as Club Member of the Year. Carl does not seem to stop, he is an active patrol member with 100% patrol attendance and Patrol Captain, he is the Nippers Age Manger Coordinator, he ran the Nippers Skills Sessions, he is a carnival official at Branch and State Level, he is the Junior Beach Team Coach, and he is the IRB Captain. Carl also helped out making sure the bar was stocked, and is currently working with council on plans to extend the surf club as well as a storage solution for the club's surf boats. The club appreciates Carl's can do attitude and thanks him for his contribution during the season.

As you read through this report, you will gain an insight into how well the club is going at all levels and in all areas. There is one area that the club is not doing particularly well at, and that is fund raising, we have moments of success but it does not seem to continue. The club is in need of a major sponsor with a long term commitment to

The club has a tremendous presence on the beach for patrols and nippers, and on the beach and in the water at carnivals. There is a huge opportunity for a major sponsor to come on board and have visibility not only at Stanwell Park Beach, but in the community and up and down the coast. Vale George Jardine

Life Member George Jardine was the youngest of four brothers who played an outstanding part in various Club activities, both in administration and surfing. The boys father William was also a Club member, joining shortly after the Club was formed in 1908. George's five sisters were also involved in Club activities

George and brother Cecil were outstanding swimmers. George was a strong belt swimmer, winning titles at Branch level in both Junior and Senior events and won the Senior Belt Championship at the Illawarra Branch titles in 1947 season. He was Vice Club Captain for five seasons in the late 1940s, and was Awarded Life Membership in 1993. In December 2006 he was honoured to christen one of the Club's surfboats "George Jardine"

George was also a notable first grade rugby league player and was a member of the 1949 St George Dragons team which beat South Sydney 19-12.

He passed away on 29 May 2015 at 88 years of age.

Vale Keith Chapman

Life Member Keith Chapman was prominent in board, ski and boat events, Vice Captain for five years in the late 1950s, Deputy President for two years in the mid-1960s. Keith also filled the role of Social Committee and was involved in many fund raising ventures. Awarded Life Membership 1969.

In the latter years of his life Keith lost his sight, but still continued to attend Annual General Meetings and Club functions with the assistance of his good friend and long time Club member George Wardman who "chauffeured" him from his home at Mortdale to Stanwell Park on these occasions.

Keith passed away on 4 February 2015 at the age of 88 years.



Vale Mick Dignam

Whilst not a life member Mick Dignam also passed away this season aged 84 years old.

Mick Dignam joined in 1945, gained his Bronze in 1948 and at the age of 19 became Chief Instructor in 1951/52. The following season Mick was elected Vice Club Captain and took over as Club Captain during the year when the Captain resigned.

He continued as Club Captain for another two seasons before being transferred to other parts of NSW as a Police Officer. Mick passed away on 9 August 2014 at the age of 84 years.



George in Rugby League

George first played with Helensburgh in a second grade competition in 1944, after having played first grade rugby union with Sydney Western Suburbs. He played locally with Northern Suburbs as a centre threequarter in 1946, the year the "Bulldogs" were admitted to the Illawarra First Grade. George represented Country Firsts in 1947, and was signed by the Saint George Club during the latter part of that year.

He was lock forward for the St George first grade grand final team in 1949 when the Dragons beat minor premier South Sydney by 19 to 12. He remained with the Saints until midway through the 1952 season, after playing 75 first grade games and established himself as one of our State's top lock forwards. Back with Northern Suburbs in 1952, George was one of the stars of the "Bulldogs" initial premiership win that year.

New Nipper Format

This season the Juniors introduced a new format to the nippers program from previous years, which will better prepare our youngsters as future life savers.

The new format, now split into 4 equal sections, still consisted of the staple Beach and Water events, but now saw a renewed Education program, plus a fun filled Skills section too.

Natalie Manley invested a lot of time in each Age Group with their very own tailor made program, designed to educate the kids in such a way that by the time these kids get to Surf Rescue Certificate (SRC) age, they will be testing the trainers and assessors themselves.

The fourth station was all about making it fun for the kids, kids love to play in the water, so that's what this "Skills" section was about. It was designed purely to give all kids a boost of confidence when coming to the beach and swimming in the surf.

We introduced the kids to the Patrol Captains and his/her team, showed them how the beach was set up and why it was set up where it was, what equipment was needed for patrol and why it was placed where it was. The kids got to handle the rescue tubes, climb over the IRB and rescue boards and sit under the shade shelter.

Not all kids are comfortable with entering the surf, just getting over the fear of getting knocked over by the crashing waves on the shore dump holds a lot kids back. So, the idea was to get the kids used to playing in the surf, learning to read when the waves came in and broke on the shore line. That as long as you kept a watch on the incoming waves, you would always get a chance to get through this shore dump to have a swim.

When the conditions were good, we had the younger kids sitting and laying down on the shore line, letting the waves rush up and over them, bowling them over etc.

Then we did little races in and out of the shore dump while watching the waves come and go. We practiced many wades in varying depths from ankles to above knees, then even trying some porpoising.

The older age groups enjoyed how we attacked the shore dump and swam out 10-15 metres, then 20 metres and further, dived down grabbed sand and resurfaced. Once we were all calm in the water, treading water or floating, we then returned to shore.

As simple as this all sounds, the continued repetition every week soon showed a lot of kids coming out of their shell, and then attempting to do the swim and/or board races in the water area. So much so, that more and more water safety was needed each week.

This skills section has provided so much confidence to all the kids, that over the season, the kids couldn't wait to be playing in the water. This could not have been possible without the water safety provided by the patrols on duty that morning. And it was the young SRC and BM holders who were only too happy to help out, something which the Junior committee is looking to utilise again next season.

SINK your toes into the sand at Stanwell Park Beach of a weekend, and be prepared to discover a melting pot of Aussie beach culture.

There are the families hitting cricket balls and sari-clad women dipping their toes in the surf, while the next generation of beach champions sprint along

At the heart of the northern Illawarra community is the Helensburgh Stanwell Park Surf Life Saving Club, which has patrolled the beach since 1908.

During that time members have strived to teach beach safety and saved countless lives, more recently training a number of champion beach athletes

Guiding them is Daniel Robberds, 27, who began coaching the club's beach teams when injuries forced him out of

competition two years ago.
"We've always had a few strong



competitors but it has built up over the last three years," Mr Robberds said.

The club secured its reputation for producing top beach sprinters when it bagged a swag of medals at the 2013 state titles, followed by four golds and three silvers at the 2014 Australian Championships.

Despite the accolades, Mr Robberds said it was the junior club members who encouraged him to stay involved in the club after 22 years.

The kids that I coach just love being a part of it and when I see them enjoying it and feeling proud of themselves, it's worth it," he said.

Helensburgh-Stanwell Park's 200-odd juniors are an important focus for the club, which recently overhauled its nippers program.

"We're focusing now on getting more kids in the water and teaching them skills, like running and diving into the water so they get more surf awareness," club president Steven McDonald said.

Mr McDonald, who joined the club 35 years ago as an eight-yearold, said surf lifesaving gave young people in particular the opportunity to learn life skills.

To offer the community the service and protection on the beach is one thing, but it also educates these kids how to deal with people and relate to people," he said.

Stanwell Park Beach is often the first stopover for tourists visiting the Illawarra's north, but it has a reputation for volatile and unpredictable conditions.

In 2011, club members were among a number of people who sprang into action after a freak sandbar collapse on a January afternoon placed the lives of more than 20 people at risk.

Sadly, one swimmer died.

Mr McDonald also praised the efforts of members who saved two people's lives in an after-

hours rescue in January 2014. He said the beach's location and difficult conditions meant it was always guarded with vigilance.

"It's always a challenge patrolling Stanwell Park Beach because you never know what you're going to get from one day to the next," the former Illawarra lifesaver of the year said.

The club has about 100 active patrolling members and about 400 in total.

In 2014 it christened a new IRB "2508" - the area postcode - in recognition of the community's

support.
"All these years the community have stuck their hands in their pockets and handed some money over to support us, so we thought we'd recognise their contribution," Mr McDonald



Inaugural HSP Awards of Excellence

On Saturday the 16th May 2015, the club took a change in direction that may well go down as a pivotal point in our history.

The decision to combine the patrol dinner and the presentation afternoon was not taken lightly. Both of the incumbent events had been part of the social calendar for the club for decades and as such were held in high regard particularly by those who had been in the club for some time. Over time though these 2 events began to lose their lustre.

It appeared to the committee and to some influential younger members that if things were left to their own devices and the club continued with these events unchanged, then they both would die a slow death leaving many of our talented members going unrecognised. The question was how could we bring about a bit of prestige to club awards and recognition of members whilst still maintaining a sense of tradition and respect for 107 years of history?

It all started at the end of last seasons presentation afternoon. A group of members were sitting around wondering how we could bring back the spark when a suggestion was floated proposing to combine the 2 events. Make it into a big showcase of our club to the Helensburgh and Stanwell Park community at large. The idea gained traction with the newly minted club committee of 2014/15 and the result was the HSPSLSC Awards of Excellence held on that fateful evening at Helensburgh Tradies.

"The 2508" IRB Launch

On Sunday, 14 December 2014 the club launched a new IRB and a Patrol Equipment Trailer. In attendance were 9 Life Members, representatives from local community groups including the Lee Evans MP Member for Heathcote, Aaron West from Helensburgh Rural Fire Service, Lynn Bedwell from Stanwell Park Public School, Anne Maree Connelly from Helensburgh Public School, and Phil Bowering Director of Tradies.

The IRB was named "2508" in recognition of the on-going support the Helensburgh, Stanwell Tops, Otford and Stanwell Park communities that make up the 2508 postcode.

Over the years the club has asked the community to stick its collective hand in its pocket for raffles, collection days, 100 clubs, buying a beer at the club bar, buying a sausage sandwich, or just making a donation to the club.

It is this ongoing support that has enabled the club to successfully patrol Stanwell Park Beach over the past 106 seasons, it has enabled to club to train and support 100's of Bronze Medallion and Surf Rescue Certificates so that there are adequate patrolling members on the beach, purchase vital surf lifesaving equipment from whistles to patrol flags, Band-Aids to resuscitation mannequins, none of this is free and needs to be funded in some way to ensure the club can carry out its charter on Stanwell Park Beach.

Not only lifesaving is supported by the community, but our competition teams and nippers are funded thru the generous support of the community and businesses in the 2508 area.

Based on this the club elected to name the IRB "2508".

So it was fitting on the day to have representatives from some of the key organisations in the 2508 area.

- 2 great school who supply the club with nippers every year
- The RFS who provide tremendous support to the community in times of crisis and provide the comfort that they are there waiting to spring into action
- Helensburgh Tradies (formerly the Helensburgh Workmen's Club) who are entrenched in the club's history, given the meeting to form a surf club was held at the Helensburgh Workmen's Club and they have been an outstanding supporter of the club over the past 106 seasons
- Members of Parliament who over the years have enabled successive governments to contribute to surf life saving

Lee Evans MP spoke on behalf of the community, with his main theme the contribution that Surf Life Saving makes to the community with 14 surf clubs in his electorate and approximately 30,000 people involve directly or indirectly with surf clubs.

The traditional christening with a fine bottle of champagne was completed, and the launch crew

consisting of driver Barry McGuiness and crew person Ryan Van Zyl proceeded to the water's edge to launch the new "2508" IRB. Those who attended the launch will attest that it was a tricky surf and a hazardous edge, and after a couple of failed attempts Barry and Ryan managed to get into the IRB and roll it on the edge.

While the IRB was taken down onto the beach, a new piece of life saving equipment was introduced. This piece of equipment was designed to reduce the early morning pain and late afternoon pain of getting equipment to and from the beach.

In the old days, it used to be just a reel and the patrol flags, and over the years more and more vital lifesaving equipment is being taken onto the beach. Today lifesavers have at their disposal on the beach Patrol Flags, Board Riders Flags, Signal Flags, a shark Flag, whistles, rescue tubes, rescue boards, sun screen, a defibrillator, spinal board, airbag oxygen resuscitator, binoculars, ATV and IRB. Enough to break the back of any rookie patrol member.

The Patrol Equipment Trailer was designed to store all of the essential items used on patrol and transport them to the beach. It will carry 3 rescue boards as well as all the other items listed above, and serve as a patrol shelter for our patrol members. The design and features, went thru many iterations with good input from patrol members. The final design was constructed to our requirements by Dingwall Trailers in Wollongong.

At the time of the launch there was no sponsor for the trailer, with a large blank space left for a prospective donor or sponsor. Not long after the launch Tradies advised that they would contribute the full cost of manufacturing the trailer as well as the signwriting. A big thanks to Tradies for their \$6,500 contribution to the trailer. The Tradies logo now features prominently on the back of the trailer.

The trailer went into service in January 2015 after the signwriting was completed, it has proved to be a hit with patrol members making their life easy getting gear onto the beach and providing good shelter and a comfortable place to sit. For the public it makes the patrol more identifiable on the beach. The trailer is a tremendous patrolling asset for the club.

Education and Training

Helensburgh – Stanwell Park Surf Club is very fortunate to have so many members who assist with the training and assessing of our members especially our patrolling members.

The team consists of Bobo White (Chief Trainer), Ralph Hall, Iris Huizinga, Klaus Liss, Natalie Manley, Gary Marshall, Peter McDonald, Stephanie McGuinness, Amy-Leigh Perrin, Geoff Ryder, Peter Turner, Russ White and Ryan Van Zyl.

This season our Trainers & Assessors needed to upgrade their awards to maintain their qualifications and accreditation. Surf Life Saving directed that all Trainers & Assessors who train or assess Cardio-Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) needed to upgrade their First Aid qualification. At one stage there was a requirement to have a proficient Spinal Management award. The Branch tried to ensure the pain was limited but it still required a big commitment from our education team with sessions at Surf House and Coalcliff Surf Club. Our members showed their normal enthusiasm and professionalism.

Awards

The Education team had to commit to many weeks for Bronze Medallion (BM) and Surf Rescue Certificate (SRC) training. This required the team to be at the beach every Sunday morning at 7:45am from the long weekend in October to mid-December (11-13 weeks). The training for BM and SRC occurred on Sunday mornings before the Nippers started. Bobo White and his team had Bronze training while Peter McDonald and his team did SRC training. The Junior Club awards and Radio Operator awards were successfully trained under Natalie Manley's guidance as part of the Juniors' new program.

The IRB trainers tried a different strategy this season to try to improve the number of members to get IRB awards. They organised the theory and IRB basics knowledge (maintenance / boat care / boat knowledge) to be done early with a greater emphasis on getting the boat hours up while on patrol.

There was some success this season but it is still hard to get younger members there on Sunday mornings after a Saturday night outing. Geoff and Gary ensured there was someone there every Sunday morning to train IRB Drivers & Crew person awards.

An important factor for the Club was that there was no person who started training for an award that didn't complete the course.

The Education team trained successfully the following awards:

- 67 Senior awards
- Surf Rescue Certificate (SRC) 19 awards
- Bronze Medallion 16 awards
- Advance Resuscitation Technique Certificate (ARTC) – 8 awards
- IRB Silver Medallion Drivers 5 awards
- IRB Crewperson 4 awards
- Radio Certificates 15 awards
- Plus 114 Junior surf awareness awards

Proficiencies

The proficiencies of patrolling members were completed while performing their patrols continuing on from the success of last season. Similar to last season the Assessors had to wait for safe surf conditions before they could assess the water elements of the proficiencies (eg. runswim-run, rescue, IRB launch). As usual the dry elements assessments (eg. resuscitation, questions, signals) there was no problems and were completed early in the season. Some of the proficiencies weren't completed until mid to late December. I would like to thank all the patrolling members for their understanding and assistance with the proficiencies.

A major problem this season was that some assessments were held up being processed on Surfguard because one or two of the people of the proficiency candidates weren't financial. This meant that the whole group (eg. 15 members) in the assessment could not be processed as proficient.

There were 4 assessing teams that looked after the patrols for Bronze Medallion (BM), Surf Rescue Certificate (SRC) & Advance Resuscitation Technique Certificate (ARTC) proficiencies.



These meetings are very important as some of our Assessors & Trainers can't attend the Branch's Education meetings because of family, work or other important commitments. All our Assessors and Trainers had to upgrade their qualifications because of a directive driven by professional training facilities (ie groups that charge for providing training and assessments).

Personally I believe that the association is being driven by money and not purely to provide surf life saving skills and knowledge. All the Trainers and Assessors that were required to upgrade their awards attended special training at Surf House and Coalcliff which was provided by the Branch & Dave Winner. Our Club is truly lucky that our Education team is so dedicated.

- Junior Education Natalie Manley showed great enthusiasm and dedication with the training and assessing of all the Junior awards, an improvement on recent seasons. This is a major task and a big thank you goes to Natalie and her helpers. Natalie tried to assist with the Surf Rescue Certificate training but in the long run most of the members wanted to be trained by Peter McDonald. In addition Natalie trained the Juniors for Radio Operator awards.
- Thanks to Geoff and Gary's efforts the Club has five new IRB Drivers and four new crewpersons.

- The Club's ATRC training this year was driven by Peter Turner and required 4 mid-week training sessions at the club house for 2-3 hours per session. Thank you to Peter McDonald, Klaus Liss, and Bobo White who assisted Peter. Their efforts meant the Club has eight new ARTC members.
- Surf Life Saving asked the Club / Education Team to organise training / surf awareness for newly arrived Australians who were attending the Conference Centre at Stanwell Tops. Stephanie volunteered to be the coordinator of an education day at Stanwell Park and with help from Iris Huizinga, Peter McDonald, Russell White plus Barry McGuinness water group the day was a huge success. Well done everyone, a truly great job and the Club was very proud of your efforts and dedication.
- Both Iris Huizinga and Peter Turner obtained the Cert IV in training and assessing this season. They have completed the mentoring and training to become facilitators and are waiting for accreditation to come through from SLSA.
- The Education Team again fulfilled their aim to improve the patrol members' lifesaving skills and ensure each patrol satisfies the Association's patrol requirements
- Thanks to Peter McDonald and Bobo White for the ongoing mentoring of our education team members to maintain our Club's excellent training and assessing standards and quality.

Education and Training

SLSNSW Youth Opportunity Makers Workshop 2014/15

In April this year Chloe Bell represented the club and branch at the SLSNSW Youth Opportunity Makers Workshop. The 4 day program is geared towards creating greater awareness of opportunities and individual abilities in 15-17 year old members and gives Branches the opportunity to recognise and develop young members who show leadership potential.

During program Chloe participated in a number of leadership development sessions and challenges as well as hearing from a number of guest speakers about the diverse range of opportunities within surf lifesaving.

Chloe and the group toured SLSNSW headquarters and participated in a Q and A session with the managers of each department in SLSNSW where they grilled them on all the "why is it like this" and "how do get involved with" questions we are all dying to ask. Other sessions included working as a team to build boats out of cardboard that could actually be rowed across water and sessions with guest speakers Andy Cross SLSNSW lifesaver of the year and the Westpac rescue helicopter crew.

The most challenging sessions by far was the club challenge which involved each participant taking on roles such as club president, captain, education officer, ect. for one of 5 theoretical clubs within a branch. The club challenge involved negotiating with other clubs to get resources and funding as well as developing strategies and a vision for what they wished their club to be.

The club challenge really pushed Chloe and the other positions to develop skills that will make them fantastic leaders in the future and gave them a great understanding of what goes into managing a surf club. Over the program Chloe has not only grown and developed into a young leader but has made a great network of friends from across the state.

Club member Stephanie McGuinness was also involved in the SLSNSW Leadership development programs as Program Coordinator for the Junior Lifesaver of the year program. This program is run over the same week as the Youth Opportunity Makers workshop and is targeted at developing leadership skills in U14 members from across the state.

Earlier this year I participated in the youth opportunity making (YOM) workshop. It was great to meet all different sorts of personalities from around all of the Branches in NSW. This camp was held at Narrabeen sports Centre, Northern Sydney. It was held for 3 nights,4days, We learnt many new skills for life and for surf club.

During the camp we had one major activity which once we did it we had to present it in front of the JLOTY'S (junior lifesavers of the years). This task was to create our own functioning surf club by going off a list given to us. Their ability was proven later when a large percentage of the water safety for the Nippers comprised of this group.

Most of the success of this large group can be attributed to their Age Manager Louise Anger (Miss Louise) who encouraged them, kept them informed of what was going on, where they had to be and what was expected of them. The season culminated in a sleep over at the surf club following the Branch Championships.

I wish them all well in the future and encourage them to go on to do their Bronze Medallion. They are a credit to the club and to their parents.

The 2015 ocean swim was successfully held on Sunday 22 March with 254 participants competing the swim from Coalcliff beach to Stanwell Park against a choppy sea. Some participants had difficulty getting out through the break at Coalcliff, and swim times were a few minutes longer than previous record times.

As usual swimmers not only came from the local area, but from all over Sydney and the South Coast. The oldest swimmer to take part was was 87 years of age and successfully completed the swim.

Since the inaugural swim in 2001, planning and organisation of the event has been primarily managed by the Ocean Swim Committee with upwards of 50 Club members assisting with conduct of the swim on the day.

Stanwell Park Ocean Challenge

"Not For the Faint Hearted"

On a dreary rainy drizzling morning we arrive at the beautiful Stanwell Park. Driven 1 1/2 hour early mostly through pouring rain from Sydney. Some days you wonder WHY was it again I go swimming? When your alarm clock goes of at 6 o'clock and it's dark, wet and windy outside you really wonder. It's a Sunday morning too.. Though deep in my heart I know once I get out of that cozy warm bed and into the car and see the sun come up all will be well. Today we skip the scenic route throughout the stunning National Park and go full length on the motorway. Less view but it allows us some much needed time for coffee on arrival.

I collect my race pack at the Stanwell Surf Club while overlooking an empty beach. Two fisher men in warm clothes and raincoats are the only ones visible and some 'lost swimmers' with umbrella's. Then there's of course the ever amazing surf life saving club members who come out and about so early to make an ocean swim event like this happen. The majority of the yellow buoys, we later so desperately will search for in the ocean, are still on land. Here they look like gigantic markers. In the ocean they are just that far away dots, often hard to spot but once sighted embraces as heavenly beacons of 'lightning' guidance.

I decide to check out the ocean at our starting point. There's only one word to describe it and that is WILD!~ Compared to the gentle flowing stream behind coming down from the mountains it's description would be better 'crazy wild'. At the beach members are also busy in setting up. One girl is tenaciously raking the beach from seaweed so we have a free spot of sand as a starting space. Later when swimming my hand often touches into a floating piece of this green sticky stuff. Though it's considered a minor a nuisance to all else we will have to conquer today.

As far as you can see it's one big chop. It's even hard to spot the first orange buoy from the beach as it keeps on disappearing behind and uneven sets of wavy patterns. To my 'delight' I also spot some long strings of blue bottles on the beach. Ah well I can only think, throw that in too and it even makes for a much better mix. Being stung by blue bottles for the first time after fourteen years in Australia, twice in two weeks, I know now I can handle that too. It's just an other mental tick on the list of challenges to comply with.

When all swimmers have been transported to the starting point there is a quick debrief. It's starts with that this swim is 'not for the fainthearted' and that there are very challenging conditions out there. Anyone not feeling comfortable or sure are suggested that it's ok to pull out there's no shame in that. Also if going out there the only way out is back to Coalcliff 'as if anywhere along the way you want to get out of the race you can't as you can't swim ashore as there is no way to get on land. There's only rocks!~ The first beach is Stanwell park!~ The swim is along the Illawarra escarpment which are big cliffs towering over the ocean. The mood is set!

Though then again this swim definitely goes straight to my top 3 of most challenging swims. With number and number two still dedicated to Bilgola. They have like Stanwell park a veto on being 'lucky' with truly blessed ocean swim weather. The one of the crazy kind people talk about for many years to come!~ The swims you remember, the swims which learn you about what REAL ocean swimming is about. The swims which stretch you mentally and physically and which put more spirit in the 'spirited you'. It was one of those swims today!~ AND when safely back on land we all concluded it to be 'awesome' as we just mastered something many of us maybe would think not capable of. Though first there is swimming today and that's lots of swimming as there's no straight line, it will be up and down the waves. We are the pink capped group and are lucky to see the previous swimmers depart and can figure out a bit what they are doing.

They seem to drift of way towards the right. Maybe there is a current pushing them that way or maybe they just can't see where they are going. It's amazing to watch how the swim on this big roller coaster of waves. It just looks awesome! At times you don't see anything and then you see a bunch of coloured sprinkles again.

I mention then that I can't even see the first buoy! On which a girl comments aim for the big boat that's an ocean tanker out there, sort of in line with the first buoy. Yep that's a big ship! A few of us decide to start out of the barrier and raked area so if we will drift we end up more in line with the buoy. Then it's time to run into that wild crazy ocean and of we go. Going where? As it's just sets of waves and more sets and more... there's not much running todo as the whitewash pushes you back. The only ways is to start swimming and dive under. BUT then I remember the advice 'to not really dive' as there are all rocks beneath. Dilemma!~ Though when I see others dive under, I dive too.

Then the first part swimming is just that crazy it's up and down and up and down and up and down without seeing anything no buoy, IRB and even that bloody (excuse the language) big ship is nowhere to be seen. It's hard to understand if you've never swim in an ocean like this. As what happens is your horizon disappears and the messy waves are blocking your view. Only guidance are your fellow cappers, and just fingers crossed that they have a clue where they are going. When you finally sport the first buoy you are delighted as you know soon you will be swimming in the wide open and mostly it's a bit calmer out there. Though again not today!~ I've never swum out in such a roller coaster as normally there's a few waves and once you've managed them it gets more quiet though today it just keeps on coming.

It does not stop and with the first buoy the turning point it does not stop either .The heavy chop doesn't allow you to see much and only when a wave lifts you up do you realise you are not the only one out there, there's lots of others in front and besides you. All you can see is just some dots of red, yellow and pink soon to be mixed with the fastest races of the green caps, behind us. I'm ecstatic when I spot the first marker, meaning I'm on course.

At no point even in this wild ocean I feel unsafe, it amazes me how at peace I am within myself in this wilderness. The surf life saving crew flying by on their jet ski also helps as you know there are people out there keeping an eye on you, just in case. I have to say that I've never seen any swim where the life savers where so visible. Their orange rash vest just seem to glow in this dark weather. Maybe it's because they are brand-new, maybe it's a different orange colour then normally used but it's highly visible and few times I mistake a lifesaver on a paddle board in the distance for a buoy. Bless them, each of them for being such a long time in the wide open in this crazy weather just to keep us safe.

By the time I can spot the second buoy rain start to hurdle down and the sky turns overly grey and the visibility diminishes enormously. There's no reason to get upset about rain when swimming as you are wet already though in this wildness here today it just adds an other element to be conquered and that's being able to see even less. I'm so delighted when I finally can see an orange buoy, the turning can inwards towards Stanwell Park beach, or what I think is an orange buoy. All I quickly do is make a

mental picture to where it stands in regards to the headland behind it as then I can keep that as a marker in my head. As the buoy keeps on appearing and disappearing and even does so when very close.

"I think this is the best surf life saving cheering squad I've ever encountered on any beach after a swim."

From here on it's getting pushed big time into towards the beach and towards the finish line. Somehow I also feel quite emotional as it's that you feel that you have stretched yourself just that little bit behind your own limitations, you lifted a tip of veil of what you thought your inner strength was capable of. It's a remarkable feeling!~

While running out lots of people many of them slsc club members yell 'well done', 'well done'. There's also many young surf life savers out and about here on the beach front today. I think this is the best surf life saving cheering squad I've ever encountered on any beach after a swim. Though then I guess every one here today finishing this race definitely deserves a big well done!

Stanwell Park Ocean Challenge 2015: swimmers triumph in choppy seas

A gloomy, drizzly start to the day failed to dampen the spirits of hundreds of eager ocean swimmers who took to the northern Illawarra coastline on Sunday morning for the Stanwell Park Ocean Challenge.

The annual 2.3-kilometre swim from Coalcliff to Stanwell Park attracted a smaller turnout than in previous years, with 265 people registering and 234 swimmers taking part.

Numbers in previous years have topped 400, event organiser Andrew Perrin said, almost half of whom register on the day.

He said unfavourable weather conditions made the going tough and tested the skill and strength of participants like no previous year's event had.

"In the history of the event I think these are the most

challenging conditions we've had," he said.

"It was very windy, choppy, making it harder for the swimmers to keep on the course and see the buoys in front of them."

While praising the swimmers' efforts, Mr Perrin reserved the biggest congratulations for event volunteers from both the Stanwell Park and Coalcliff surf lifesaving clubs, saying it was harder being above the water than in it on Sunday.

"The expertise shown by both clubs in terms of water safety was second to none," he said.

"The swimmers were definitely in good hands."

Mr Perrin said the youngest competitors were 14 years old, while the oldest was an 87-year-old.

Treasurers Report

This Financial Report covers the 12 month period 1 April 2014 to 31 March 2015. All income and expenditure in this report and the Financial Statements are expressed as net amounts exclusive of GST.

Financial activities are recorded in a single "whole-of-Club" account using MYOB accounting software. The performance of individual sections of the Club is readily identifiable and monitored by the use of cost codes in the accounting system. Profit and Loss Reports for the main Club (senior section), Junior Activities, Winter Swimming section, and the Building Fund are included with the Financial Statements.

Income from donations and sponsorship totalled \$26,679. This included sponsorship of \$6,500 from Tradies Helensburgh and \$3,690 donated by the local community on Lifesavers Appeal Day. The Australian Government provided grants of \$5,000 for beach safety equipment, and \$3,000 to assist with transport expenses for youth athletes. A Patrol Services Grant of \$2,588 was received from Wollongong City Council.

Two community fund raising events were run this year, the 2015 Ocean Swim and 2014 Stanwell Scramble with income totalling \$13,847. Income from raffles totalled \$2,506.

\$5,000 was expended on the purchase of a custom made beach patrol trailer, and \$9,944 on asset replacements including an IRB motor, two rescue boards and four rescue tubes. Two "near new" racing skis for senior competitors were also acquired. Value of Club assets at year end was assessed at \$129,523.

Overall, a surplus of \$3,379 was recorded for the year, compared with a loss of \$1,436 in the 2013-14 financial year.

Club account (senior section)

A deficit of \$9,399 was recorded for the year, primarily brought about by transfer of \$12,443 to the Building Fund as part repayment of funds used to print the Club's History Book. \$13,633 was received from sale of 193 books and the auction of five 'limited edition' books.

Cash at year end was \$57 with payments totalling \$3,525 due from members and other debtors. Saleable stock

(history books, clothing and bar stocks) was valued at \$10,726.

Refreshment Trading

The bar was open for trading on Sundays for winter swimming activities, and during the summer season on Sundays and Friday evenings. Net bar profit was \$9,076; 50% of this was allocated to the Building Fund and the balance retained for general Club expenses.

Junior Section

Cash at year end was \$9,038 with a deficit of \$2,852 recorded. Clothing stock was valued at \$11,581.

Net income of \$2,680 was realised from food sales associated with Sunday Junior Activity days and Friday evening sales.

Winter Swim section

Cash at year end was \$1,964 with a deficit of \$1,628 recorded; \$3,723 was donated during the year to Cram House Foundation. Clothing stock was valued at \$1,734.

Building Fund

\$24,014 was added to the Building Fund during the year, bringing the fund total to \$138,440. This included bank interest of \$2,465, profit from the 2015 Ocean Swim (\$4,858) and 50% of the bar profit (\$4,248). A further \$12,443 was returned to the Building Fund, being approximately two-thirds of the temporary loan allocated to print the Club's History Book.

Financial Position

At 31 March 2014, the Club was not in debt to any supplier (other than within 30 day trading terms). At the date of this report, this statement is still valid.

Donations and fund raising

Donations received and income from fund raising activities are clearly identified in the accounts.

All donated funds were expended for the purpose for which they were sought, this being primarily for lifesaving and patrol operations, rescue equipment and education and training of members, other than for the following exceptions –

- donations to the Winter Swimming section which were specifically sought for CRAM House Foundation and other community related activities,
- donations associated with the hosting of the Ocean Swim and Stanwell Scramble events which in turn increased the net return to the Club, and
- donations which were specifically sought and/or offered for competitive activities.

No member of the Club was entitled to or gained any personal benefits from any donations received.

GST reporting

Stanwell Scramble

The Stanwell Scramble was a fund raising initiative set up in 2011-12 by the boaties in order to help fund equipment for the boat section. The event has shown great potential but unfortunately there has been limited success so far.

2012-13 saw a small field of approx 30-40 runners stomp the sand for a small profit to the boaties. 2013-14 saw the event not held due to the commitments of key personnel within the boatie section unable to devote sufficient time to the staging of the event. In 2014-15 the Stanwell Scramble returned to the beach with a greater effort put towards promotion of the event. Again the event drew a small crowd but again the event didn't produce a loss so the potential for economies of scale are huge and a juicy profit could be made if the right formula is found.

Quarterly Business Activity Statements were submitted to the Australian Taxation Office by the Public Officer. At 27 May 2015, the Club was not in debt to the ATO, and there were no outstanding GST reports.

Audit of Accounts

This overview and the detailed Financial Statements were prepared by Harley Dreghorn after checking of MYOB entries against receipt books, payment vouchers, bank statements and other documentation. Following review and endorsement of the Financial Statements by the Management Committee at its meeting on 28 May 2015, the Financial Statements and all Club documentation were submitted for audit by an independent auditor as required by the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991.

The audit was undertaken by Paul Mattock from Twelve Financial Pty Ltd; the Auditor's Report is included as part of the Financial Statements printed elsewhere in this report.

Whilst greater emphasis was placed on promotion of the event through flyers and social media, the event struggled to convert this into actual entries. An integrated entry and payment method is needed to easily facilitate the process of entry and the ability to increase the prospects of profit from the event.

Thanks to Bluey and the boaties for their efforts in staging the event this season and don't be disheartened that the event numbers were not quite there "Build it, and they will come". Thanks to the committee for their continued support of this initiative, if we keep working together to resolve the issues the event faces over the coming seasons there is no doubt that the event will prove to be a success in future years.

Governance

The Club's affairs continue to be controlled and managed by the Management Committee. The Committee is comprised of 16 positions, however with three (3) positions not filled, the committee consisted of only 13 members this year.

The Club Executive Committee had seven of eight positions filled, with decisions taken by the Executive confirmed at subsequent Management Committee meetings.

Various sub-committees existed to deal with specific functions, reporting to the Management Committee

Special General Meetings

A Special General Meeting was held on Saturday 28th March 2014 to elect the junior section committee and officers for 2015-16 season. The majority of Junior Activities Committee positions responsible for running the junior section were filled at this meeting with the other junior officer positions either filled at the SGM or to be appointed by the JAC.

Executive Committee

Three meetings of the Executive Committee were held during the year to deal with matters that required urgent attention due to time constraints and could not be held over to the following Management Committee meeting.

The minutes of these meetings were subsequently tabled at Management Committee meetings.

Education Committee

A new requirement from NSW SLS required the Education section to meet for at least 2 minuted meetings to discuss issues relating to awards and training.

A season kick off meeting was held at Chief Training Officer Bobo White's place to discuss the year ahead with regards to awards and proficiencies. The Education Committee then met as required to further discuss Proficiencies and awards/training in the club.

Subsequent minutes were tabled at the clubs Management Committee meetings and submitted to Illawarra Branch

Management Committee

Twelve Committee meetings were scheduled from July 2014 through to June 2015. On most occasions, there were enough Management Committee members present to hold the meeting as a scheduled Management Committee.

The Management Committee continues to be the avenue for all members to have input into the operations of the club.

Junior Activities Sub-Committee

The Junior section (Seagulls) was controlled by the Junior Activities Committee which dealt with day to day matters autonomously and convening regular meetings through out the 2014-15 season.

The upcoming season 2015-16 has a fully elected Junior activities committee pumped and ready to go for the new season. Meetings are already underway with ideas for the season ahead and refine initiatives implemented last season

Winter Swim Group (Stanwell Park Sea Eels)

The winter swimming group was controlled by the Stanwell Park Sea Eels sub-committee and dealt with day to day matters autonomously. The Sea Eels sub-committee was elected at a meeting of Club members and fellow members of Coalcliff SLSC and other surf clubs interested in, and participating in winter swimming.

The Sea Eels continued to function as an autonomous committee on day to day matters.



Membership Management

Membership Fees

This year it was assessed the cost to the Club to operate as an incorporated association, and pay for insurance, building utility costs and membership levies (apportioned across 515 members) was \$38.95 per member.

The budgeted cost for 2015-16 for the Club to operate as an incorporated association, and pay for insurance, building utility costs and membership levies (apportioned across 400 members) was \$45.50 per member.

Membership fees for 2014-15 will therefore be remain at the rate of \$60.00. A reduction of \$10.00 is available for members who renew their membership before the end of September

Collection of Membership Forms and Fees

The Registrar position for the club was filled by the junior registrars Jodie Williams and Karen Gallagher for season 2014-15. The club noted an improved level of membership related administration coordination this season by having appointed a delegated Registrar which was unfortunately missing from season 2013-14 ensuring that the club continues the upkeep of its membership databases.

Members are encouraged to renew online as this updates all surf lifesaving databases instantly ensuring that your membership is compatible with all other lifesaving online entry systems.

Injuries to members

Two members suffered injury during season 2014-15. A patrol member was injured during the course of their duties when a patrol shelter was dislodged by wind inflicting a broken arm to the patrol member. Another member was injured during the course of their duties whilst performing water safety for the club at the Junior NSW State Titles

two members sought re-imbursement for medical expenses under the NSW Workers Compensation (Bush Fire, Emergency and Rescue Services) Act 1987

Welfare of Members – Member Protection Policy

Similar to other organisations where people work with children, Surf Life Saving requires members to complete a "volunteer/student declaration" as part of the NSW Government's "Working with Children Check" program.

Currently a form is only signed and recorded once for club records as well as noted in surfguard. New government legislation requires that all members over the age of 18 will be required to undergo a working with children check prior to 1st April 2016 across the surflifesaving movement.

The club will present a new policy of when this is to occur ie at registration or otherwise in the coming months in preparation for the change in the working with children check

The Club's Child Protection Co-ordinator for 2014-15 was Ed White, Secretary.

Competition Levy

At the end of season 2011-12, the outgoing committee looked in detail at the clubs finances and found that and a large chunk of funds was being spent on competition. This remains the case in season 2014-15

The rate of the competition levy remained at \$100 for over 19 year olds and \$30 for those U19. A more coordinated effort to send out invoices to competitors and in chasing up members has resulted in this policy being more successful than in previous seasons.

The competition levy will be continually reviewed each season as to its effectiveness and comparison made against its stated outcomes.

Communications appear to work reasonably well through surfguard but must not be used at the exclusion of other communication medium.

It is envisioned by the club committee that email, SMS, website, hardcopy post, local news articles and advertisement be used together to provide the greatest chance of reaching our intended audience. Social Media also forms part of this communication strategy

The number of characters available for use by Surfguard users was reduced to less than the standard 160 characters by Telstra as it now inserts the words "Powered by Telstra" into each SMS communication.

A greater use of paper based snail mail was used as part of the clubs communication avenues. A number of bigger events were promoted this way to try and circumvent the "Junk Mail" filter of email.

Website

Again the Website this functionality was extending this season providing a lot more value than seasons past. Under the direction of club president Steve McDonald, the website now includes a number of added features including rsvp functions for club events, published club policies, and hire information.

The website will continue to undergo organic development into the upcoming season as required.

CRAM House Foundation

Stanwell Park Sea Eels again hosted the intellectually disabled young people from CRAM House in Wollongong to a day out at Helensburgh Workers Club during August. Supporting these young people has been on-going commitment of the Sea Eels since 1998.

Temporary Storage and Future Building Works

The club has for some time had storage issues for our competition and patrol gear. Quality gear is seen by the committee as a means to aid in membership development and membership retention but as the club has limited funds to continually replace equipment due to condition it is imperative that we look after our gear.

The club is in the process of sorting out a temporary solution for gear and equipment off premises of the surfclub. Shipping containers will be utilised to ensure that club gear remains in adequate storage.

Plans for a more permanent storage facility are progressing through the tireless efforts of Carl Williams who is gathering quotes and has engaged council in discussions. This is going to be a long haul so patience from our membership is required.

Statutory Information



Annual Statement for Incorporated Associations

The Annual Statement for 2013-14 financial year, as required by the *Associations Incorporations Act* 1984 was submitted to the Office of Fair Trading in August 2014.

Financial Reporting

As required by the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991, the Club is required to submit an audited financial report covering the whole of Club operations each year. A summary of the 2014-15 Financial Report is included elsewhere in this report.

Compliance with SLS NSW requirements

The Financial Report for 2013-14 was submitted to Surf Life Saving NSW together with Application for Affiliation for 2014-15 in August 2014.

At the date of this report, the Club Executive believes that all documentation and other matters required by SLSNSW have been completed.

Liquor Licence

On 13 September 2012, OLGR issued a new On-Premises Licence for Stanwell Park Surf Club, with Michael Dent appointed as the Manager of the Licence – Licence LIQO 660031060.

No incidents relating to the Liquor Licence were recorded during the year.

Health and Safety

No inspection has been done so far this year.

Environmental management

Refuelling of IRBs and the quad bike within the boat shed and paved outdoor area is the predominant environmental risk. Similar to previous years, the risk continued to be mitigated by the availability of a spill kit located in the boat shed, and briefing of IRB crews and patrol members on their duty of care when refuelling.

Food business notification

Notification and registration of the Club as the operator of a food business (dispensing of drinks and preparation and sale of food items) was forwarded to the NSW Food Authority in October 2004 and is still current.

Asset Register

Club officers undertook a detailed review of all assets during march 2015 which has resulted in a complete update of the Asset Register, and the club database. Lifesaving and patrol assets as well as competition assets are recorded on Surfguard.

Values were established for all Club assets for insurance purposes, and for inclusion of asset values in the financial accounts.

A summary of the Asset Register is included at the end of this report

Insurance

Insurance policies covering fire and burglary of Club property and equipment within the Surf Club, as well as policies for theft and damage to the IRBs and surf boats, and motor vehicle insurance for the ATV, boat trailers and board trailer were maintained. All insurance was affected through brokers Jardine Lloyd Thompson Pty Ltd who manage insurance for most other surf clubs.

Public liability insurance to an amount of \$20M was effected through a policy maintained by SLS NSW, the cost being covered in part by the membership levy contribution of \$14.77 (excl GST) per member payable to SLS NSW.

Directors and Officers Insurance was effected through a policy also maintained by SLS NSW at a cost of \$432.18 (excl GST).

Members continue to be covered for medical expenses incurred as a result of an injury whilst involved in an approved surf club activity through the NSW government scheme for volunteer workers. Members who become incapacitated and unfit for work as a result of an injury, are also re-imbursed for loss of wages for a limited period.

Notes to the Financial Statements

The Financial Report covers all operations and activities of Helensburgh-Stanwell Park Surf Life Saving Club Incorporated including sub-groups, as an individual entity.

Helensburgh-Stanwell Park Surf Life Saving Club Incorporated is an association incorporated in NSW under the *Associations Incorporations Act* 2009.

1 Basis of Preparation

The Financial Report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board, and to meet the requirements of the Associations Incorporations Act 2009, and the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 and Regulations under those Acts.

The Financial Report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs, modified where applicable by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets, and financial liabilities.

Income Tax

The Association is exempt from Income Tax under Division 51, Section 50-10 of the Income Tax Assessment Act, 1997.

Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Property, Plant and Equipment

The Association does not own any real property.

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value as indicated less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

2 Financial Instruments

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office.

GST recoverable (\$1,397) from the Australian Tax Office for period 1 January 2015 to 31 March 2015 is included in the accounts as a Current Liability.
