- A strategy to increase funding through sponsorship and donations from local businesses was successful.
- The local community continued to support the Club as it has done for years, whilst this year financial support was also received from three levels of Government.

President's Report

2018/2019 President's Report

This report is to highlight the achievements and conduct of Helensburgh-Stanwell Park Surf Life Saving Club in its 112th season of serving the public and providing a safe environment for the public to use Stanwell Park Beach, training life savers, competing at surf carnivals and providing a breeding ground for future life savers.

Life Saving

Well that was a season of highs and lows, while maintaining the clubs patrol strength and presence on the beach there was a slight drop in patrolling numbers. 7 Patrol committed to patrolling from the end of September thru to the end of April, a total of 7 months. Rostered patrol members averaged 50+ voluntary hours on patrol, and many went above beyond with many more additional hours thru their activities relating to water safety, emergency callouts and just supporting other patrols.

To start with the low, with the season only a couple of days old a life was lost during patrol hours but out of the patrolled area. The patrol on the day were exemplary in the actions, they had been conducting roving patrols throughout the afternoon and up until the incident. Unfortunately, many swimmers ignored the warnings about swimming out of the patrolled area.

The whole patrol banded together in effort to save the life of the swimmer. With the patient supported by surfers (life savers from a Cronulla SLSC) attempting CPR out in the water while the IRB was launched. CPR continued with the patient in the IRB and then back on-shore. With resources stretched, members-maintained patrolling of the flagged area, they carried the Air Bag and Defibrillator up the beach in the absence of a functioning ATV, managed a growing crowd of on-lookers and co-ordinated emergency services resources. The patrol was assisted during the resuscitation by a doctor from Melbourne on the beach, and then paramedics. Despite all attempts the patient lost their life.

Credit must go to Patrol Captain – Carl Williams and Vice-Captain – James Webb for their efforts on the day, along with the rest of the patrol made up of mainly younger female members. Subsequent to the incident, the patrol were supported by the surf life saving community through a de-brief session and one-on-one support as required. Throughout the season the patrol was resilient in the attitude to patrolling and stuck together for the entire season, given the easy option of walking away.

The club elected the patrol as Patrol of the Year for their efforts on the day, and their dedication to patrolling throughout the rest of the season. Carl Williams was awarded Patrol Captain of the Year for his leadership and drive to maintain this patrol as an effective patrol for the remainder of the season, and he subsequently won the Surf Life Saving Illawarra Patrol Captain of the

Year, and is a finalist for Surf Life Saving NSW Patrol Captain of the Year.

Highs were many, with the club leading the way in expanded patrolling to the air. The club proposed that patrolling with a UAV in the 2018-2021 Life Saving Agreement, and from this the club was the first to conduct a patrol in the Illawarra using a UAV (Drone). The club was fortunate to received the support of the Westpac Life Saver Rescue Drone Program with the club's own drone for patrolling. 6 club members have been trained as UAV Pilots for surf life saving. The training helped members identify sharks and their characteristics including dangerous and non-threatening species, navigate the air space above the beach, and fly the drone for patrols and search-and-rescue. The club is fortunate to have Mike Malherbe as Chief Pilot, he has guided members in the use of the drone and ensured that each of the members in the UAV Surveillance Team are competent flyers. The team consists of Steven McDonald, Aaron Wallace, Johnathon LeMesurier, Mathew Webber and Lachlan McDonald. Lachlan is the youngest UAV Pilot in NSW for surf life saving. To date 2 sharks have been spotted, along with some massive bait balls and a number of other friendly marine creatures. Together the team has flown over 100 hours on patrol and has been called to assist in a search-and-rescue operation in the Royal National Park. The team was awarded with the Surf Life Saving Illawarra Innovation Award for the 2018/2019 Season.

Patrol members made a huge number of Preventative Actions whilst patrolling, ensuring the swimming public were keep safe and avoided the need to be rescued. Whilst the patrol members work hard to prevent issues, still the public needed to be rescued with patrol members making 92 Rescues during the season. Many of the rescues were outside the flags and some rescues were more than 300m from the patrolled area. It is unfortunate that members of the public ignore the signs they walk best when they get to the beach, and then ignore the direction of life savers and any warnings on the beach.

The club's rescue capability was strengthened with the christening of 2 new IRB's during the season. Both named after great club members. The "Tanya Potter", with Tanya being honoured as the first female member to gain their Bronze Medallion. The "Mark 'Thommo' Thompson", in recognition of Mark's many years of patrolling, his role as Club Captain and Club President, and his on-going service as a carnival official. Towards the end of the season a new ATV was delivered, that will go into service at the beginning of the 2019/2020 Season.

The season was made easier with the appointment of a new Club Captain. Anthony Rooskie took on the role as Club Captain early in the season. Anthony has been

involved in life saving for many years, gaining his Bronze Medallion at Warrilla-Barrack Point SLSC and rowing surf boats, he paused his life saving career for a few years while he pursued other avenues and now settling in Stanwell Park with his young female has returned to Surf Life Saving. He is a very dedicated and knowledgeable life saver with lots of progressive ideas. I look forward to working with him over the next few season to implement his plans.

There is a buzz around life saving, with members actively patrolling and looking at ways the club can expand it's patrolling capability. Being the closest club to the Royal National Park and the popularity of the natural attractions on offer, there is increasing demand for life saving services in the event of an incident. A group of members is looking to specialise in their response to these incidents....stay tuned to see what the club will develop.

Many thanks to all members who patrolled during the season, congratulations to the 22 members who met 100% of the patrol commitment, and thankyou to the Patrol Captains and Vice-Captains for managing resources effectively and efficiently to patrol Stanwell Park Beach.



Competition

There was a general increase in participation in competition during the season, anchored by the U/19 Male Surf Boat Crew. They competed in the Warilla Bowls South Coast Surf Boat Premiership, the ASRL, Branch, State and Australian Championships and represented the Illawarra at the NSW Inter-branch Championships. A great crew and an awesome team of supporters who trekked up and down the coast as far south as Lorne and north as the Gold Coast. They claim so commendable results including the U/19 South Coast Boat Premiership, U/19 Illawarra Branch Championship and a top 16 finish at the Aussies. Well done to Sweep Ed White, Hamilton Riley, Matt Anger, Drew Walsh and Dakota Curkoski, along with stand-in sweep Nick Lowe and Mitchell Sweeny. The crew acquire a new surf boat, named after the legendary Graham "Cookie" Cook, funded thru the support of WestFund Health Insurance.

On the beach Jack Bridges held the fort, including a 3rd at the NSW Championship in the U/17 Beach Flags and Beach Sprint, and then backed up with a 2nd at Aussies (although under a different cap). Jack also received a Highly Commended for Illawarra Athlete of the Year. Jack was joined on the beach by the up and coming U/15 girls beach relay team on Sabina Rogers, Madie Agnew, Mia Corliss and Abbey Bailey, the girls claimed a 2nd place at the NSW Championship on top of their 2nd at the Junior State. Sabina Rogers claimed a Gold Medal at the NSW Age Championship in the U/14 Female Beach Flags and a Bronze in the U/14 Female Beach Sprint, and then a 2nd in the U/15 Female Beach Flags at the NSW Championships.

With the flags down, the IRB Team hit the water competing in 4 rounds of the NSW IRB Premiership and the NSW IRB State Championship. The Sea Wolves expanded their membership to 10, lead by Anthony Ashley and Mathew Webber, the team included Guy Ezzeddine, Barry McGuinness, Tahlia Bailey, Noah Watson, Steven & Lochie McDonald, Jack Dabrowski and Oliver Watson, and Team Manager Christie Webber. While not bringing home any silverware, they preformed consistently improving on their results each round including a couple of finalists at the State Championships. The skills that have been learnt during the competition season not only benefit the racing team but our patrolling life savers. Competing ensure that our equipment is in top operating condition and will be maintained that way throughout the patrolling season.

It is great to see the Red, White and Blue Cap on the beach in competition. We have some solid foundations across the surf boat, beach and IRB areas of competition. It will be great to build upon this and get some more competitors in action.

A massive thanks to our officials on the beach and in the water – Mark Thompson, Carl Williams and Bobo White supporting the club at Branch, State and Australian Championships, along with several other members who have assisted throughout the season. Congratulations to Carl Williams on being names the Illawarra Official of the Year. A special mention to a new member Joshua Cole, who acted as the club's IRB Official during the IRB season, the club appreciates your support in ensuring the team was able to compete.

Junior Activities – Seagulls

There is no question that nippers is an essential part of surf life saving, it prepares our young members to be the life savers of the future. The quality of nippers coming through the current program demonstrated the success of what the club is doing. The water skills is proving such a success that our Surf Rescue Certificate candidates require very little assistance in complete the water based competencies of their award, and this continues into their Bronze Medallion training.

President's Report

11 nippers transitioned to the senior club by completing their Surf Rescue Certificate, with all of the commencing their patrolling career. They are all very enthusiastic and engaged in the patrolling activities.

It was great to see 2 nominees in the Illawarra Junior Life Saving of the Year Program with Madi Agnew and Sabina Roger making the final. They performed very well in the interview section, but unfortunately didn't take out the awards.

The nippers committee ran a good season, trying out some new ideas that included "Santa Photos" on the Beach as a fundraiser, this was well supported by families from the club and local community. Despite the windy day, the photos turned out very well. They also ran a Beach Flags Legends Day bringing in a number of former Beach Flag Champions to assist the nippers in beach flags techniques. Many thanks to Luke Potter, Jack Bridges and Trish McCarthy, and special guest starter Mark Thompson for their assistance on the day. Looking forward to expanding the legends program next season across some of the other competition areas.

Well done to the Junior Activities for their efforts during the season. Steve Agnew in his 3rd year as Chairperson and Therese Weber (former nipper) as Secretary, Todd Andrews (former nipper) as Treasurer did a great job organising a very successful season. A big thanks to the Water Safety Team led by Lee Bailey, Carl Williams, Michael Ross and Jason Smit, these guys support the nippers as they venture into the Stanwell Park shore dump and beyond.

A great season all round.

Members Development and Training

One of the most challenging yet rewarding parts of life saving is getting new members through their awards. Bobo White and his team have done well to training 11 SRC, 13 Bronze Medallion, 10 IRB Crew, 7 IRB Drivers, 5 Silver Medallion Basic Beach Management, 1 RWC Operator, 6 ARTC and 6 UAV Pilots. A very big year for awards training.

Maintaining our trainer, assessor and facilitators skills is proving more and more difficult every season as more responsibility and compliance requirements are loaded on them. Our team want to be able to train members for the key patrolling awards of SRC, BM, IRB Driver & Crew, ARTC and BBM, but this seems to get harder and harder each session. It seems at times that life saving loses its way with training new members for life saving and concentrates on ticking boxes to comply as a registered training organisation rather than a surf life saving organisation.

Any support members can give to help out our team would be most appreciated.

Well done Bobo and the Education Team on another excellent season.

Member Retention

The following is a cut and paste from last seasons report, but nothing has really changed – *"Retaining members in a voluntary organisation is always a challenge with so many competing interests, it is hard to inspire members to give up their time to stand on the waters edge and watch out for people that they have no relationship with. Fortunately, we have over 100 members who willing do this, but how do we keep them in the club and what opportunities can the club give them?"*

Surf Boat Rowing is great for retention, as you need 4 members for a crew plus a sweep that gives you 5 patrol members, another crew another 5 patrol member, and so on.

Luckily this season the IRB Racing Team forms, and while not bringing in any new members yet, it provides another avenue for members to pursue, and it maintains interest all year round.

I encourage members to get involved in club activities, to look beyond just the patrolling aspect and embrace all of club life. Drag your friends to the beach, to club functions, to Friday Night Drinks and give them a glimpse into surf club life. They may not all join up, but another 1 member is better than no new members. If you have an idea for the club or a program you would like to run, then talk to the committee we are all ears!"

Acoustics Upgrade – Complete

More than 2 years after receiving the grant for the Acoustics Upgrade, the project was completed on 08 July 2019. The works were completed by Innocon Pty. Ltd. a company based in Smithfield whose General Manager – Ben Holland has young nippers at Helensburgh-Stanwell Park.

Innocon has transformed the hall as per the architects (former member Michelle (Ryder) Viret) design. The works included completely replacing the ceiling, installed acoustic panels on the ceiling and some of the walls, upgrading the old fluoro tube lights to energy efficient dimmable LED lights and lobster pot inspire feature lights, storage at the western end of the hall, a magnificent timber bar leaner across the windows overlooking the beach and a coat of paint. The hall looks amazing and feels great.

Part of the renovation included the re-instatement of the "Buy-A-Brick" Program recognition. The names have been transcribed onto a perspex sheet and attached to the exposed brick wall at the entrance to the hall.

Thanks to Harley Dreghorn for managing the project and keeping it on track.

The project was funded by a grant from the NSW Government for 80% of the cost with the club kicking in the other 20% from the building fund.

Making The Building Accessible – A New Project

During the season a local architect approached the club offering his services to help with some concepts for improving the club. After some conversations it was decided that the aim of the project would be to make the club accessible, this includes accessible toilets on the ground floor and first floor of the building, and a method to assist in getting people from the ground floor up into the club house.

Local architect Brett Sherson presented several concepts to the club executive during the season. The committee is supportive of a concept that involves the installation of a lift, reconfiguration of the 1st floor toilets, making the kitchen and bar more functional, reconfiguration of the ground floor toilets to include storage, potentially a gym and small hole in the wall café.

While we are not ready to start knocking down walls at this stage, it is positive that we have made a start.

Finally

To the Executive and Management Committee, thank you for your support during the season, we are making great progress with sponsorship activities, patrols are great, competition is thriving, and club governance is strong.

Thanks to every member who contributed to the on-going success of the club.

Your enthusiasm for being an active member of our community who cares about the safety of other beachgoers is greatly appreciated by everyone and continues the strong tradition of service at HSPSLSC.

Focus areas for next season

- To continue working on the best patrol strategies to support visitors at the end of the beach which is away from the flags. In particular, those people from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds who visit Stanwell Park.
- Under the direction of our IRB Captain, continue to focus on improving our IRB driver and crew capabilities across all patrols.
- Developing patrol succession planning to provide opportunities for younger patrol members to take on leadership roles and access further training opportunities
- Phasing out older rescue equipment with newer items (for example fibreglass rescue boards replaced with user-friendly foam boards)
- A review of all beach signage and investigation into electronic signage options
- Working on increasing our patrolling members with a focus on recruiting mature age members from the local community
- Exploring volunteer patrol options to promote better active reserve participation in patrols

Education and Training

Chief Training Officer's Report

This year was a bit harder than normal as we lost Peter Turner to the Sunshine Coast (family) and Klaus Liss to China (work). Peter & Klaus have been major contributors to our Education Team for a number of years and they were missed. Luckily we had the expertise and knowledge of Mr Mac (Peter McDonald), Geoff Ryder and Ralph Hall to continue the high standard of training and assessing. Helensburgh – Stanwell Park Surf Club is fortunate to have such members who can assist with the training and assessing of our members enhancing the skills of our patrolling members. **We would like to see some new members join our Education team next season.**

The team this season consisted of Bobo White (Chief Trainer), Ralph Hall, Peter McDonald, and Geoff Ryder.

The Association is always placing additional burdens on our Education members to ensure their qualifications are current. I would like to thank our Education team for their time and efforts in satisfying these extra demands which is in addition to their actual training and assessing of the candidates for their awards.

As in previous seasons we utilised our Patrol Captains and expert patrol members to assist in ensuring our patrol members have maintain all their existing skills (eg water rescues, resuscitation, IRB operations etc). Thank you – Steph & Barry McGuinness, Karl Weber, Ed White, Nick Lowe, Carl Williams, Steve McDonald, Anthony Rooskie, Anthony Ashley, Ralph Hall and Matt Webber. The more often we can get our patrol members in the water the better.

Awards

The Education team had to commit to several weeks for the Bronze Medallion (BM) and Surf Rescue Certificate (SRC) training. The team commits to being at the beach every Sunday morning from the beginning of the season to at least mid-December (11 -13 weeks). The training for BM and SRC occurred on Sunday mornings before the Nippers started. Bobo White and his team trained the Bronze Medallion while Peter McDonald trained the SRC with minimal assistance. Well done Mr Mac.

Ralph Hall trained an ART (AID) squad in the later part of the season. This training required 5 mid-week training sessions at the club house for 2-3 hours per session. Thanks Ralph.

The Junior Club's training had a new education officer this season and she is still learning the ropes. Greater guidance by the club will be required next season to assist the new education officer.

This season the IRB training was enhanced by Ash (Anthony Ashley) who is getting the club back into IRB racing at carnivals. I expect next season to see an increase in IRB awards because of Ash's initiative. We

had a number of our younger members under the training of our more experience IRB Drivers which allowed them to acquire sufficient skills and hours in the boat to obtain IRB awards.

A reminder to everyone, ensure all hours of IRB training are recorded in the IRB logbook. New IRB Drivers and Crewies need proof of the actual hours training in the logbook. I'm sure we can improve on this next season. Well done everyone.

An important fact for the Club was that ALL people who started training successfully completed their award.

The Education team trained successfully the following awards:

- Surf Rescue Certificate (SRC) – 12 awards
- Bronze Medallion – 14 awards
- Advance Resuscitation Technique (AID) – 5 awards
- IRB Crewperson Certificate – 10 awards
- Silver Medallion IRB Drivers – 7 awards
- Silver Medallion Beach Management – 5 awards
- Rescue Water Craft Operator Certificate – 1 award
- Junior Surf Play – 20 awards.

Proficiencies

The proficiencies of our patrolling members were completed while performing their patrols. Anthony Ash ran a special day for IRB maintenance and skills. This season we utilised the e-learning skills maintenance courses in the "member's portal" which helped members keep up to date with their skills.

The dry components of the assessments (eg. resuscitation, questions, signals) can be done any day on patrol but the "Run-Swim-Run" and surf rescue must wait for suitable surf conditions. Some of the proficiencies weren't fully completed until mid to late December (Mother Nature wasn't very friendly this season). I would like to thank all the patrolling members for their understanding and assistance with the proficiencies.

Overall the system appears to be working well with the following proficiencies being completed:-

- SRC – 8 members
- BM – 89 members
- ART(AID)/ARTC – 47 members
- IRB Crew – 37 members
- SM IRB Drivers – 26 members

plus 43 Junior evaluation proficiencies.

Education and Training

Education Team Highlights

- The Club had three education meetings during the season. These meetings are very important as some of our Assessors & Trainers due to the lack of Branch's Education meetings.
- The Club obtained 11 new SRC members and 14 new Bronze members. Thanks to all our trainers and Assessors. Special thanks to Mr Mac for the SRC members.
- Junior Education – a new Education Officer.
- The Club's ART (AID) training this year was driven by Ralph Hall. Thank you.
- The increase use of e-learning in members training for awards and proficiencies.
- The Education Team again fulfilled their aim to enhance all our patrol members' lifesaving skills

and ensure each patrol satisfies the Association's requirements.

- Thanks to Peter McDonald and Bobo White for the ongoing mentoring of our education team members to maintain our Club's excellent training and assessing standards and quality.

Once again, I would like to thank the Club's executive and the whole education team for their continued support and efforts.

SRC Report 2018-19

This is something that I start every report off with each season, but it is something that I am proud of and more importantly something that I enjoy. I started training Surf Life Saving Certificates now the Surf Rescue Certificate, some 29 years ago when my daughter progressed from the Nippers, something I have never regretted for a number of reasons, the main one being the young members I have met along the way.

This season was no exception with 12 young adults, being 5 boys and 7 girls who all got along well. All showed great enthusiasm, all wanting to qualify so that they could wear the patrol uniform and perform patrols on the Stanwell Park beach. A great fun group, enthusiastic, and attentive, all loved the surf, and to see them attacking the surf on point score days setting an example to the younger ones was pleasing, making my biggest problem in the end was getting them out of the surf. Once again theory was not a great attraction but was made a bit of difference because of the introduction of "E-learning" which meant it was done on-line and had to be completed to receive a certificate, which also meant that they had to refer to their manuals for answers. Still quite amount of time was spent talking about local conditions, where to expect problem dangers, the north and south lagoons, rips, shore breaks and the rocks each end of the beach and lost children. I am now totally convinced that the introduction of the longer boards for point score and competition have given them the skills to take a rescue board out with confidence and return a patient back to the beach. Still the thrill of catching a wave on return to shore was most exhilarating, or actually making it back to shore was rewarding. Their ability was proven later when they performed water safety for the Nippers.

Most of the success of this group can be attributed to their Age Manager Steve Agnew who through many years' of involvement in the surf club and with this group, understands and encourages youth and our future life savers.

Out of this group came the two junior "Lifesavers of the Year" finalists for Illawarra being Mia Corliss and Sabina Rogers, although both worthy contenders they were unsuccessful and both were great ambassadors for our club.

To all those who assisted with this group, I thank you and especially to Bobo White, (Chief Training Educator) for his understanding of surf conditions faced by the group and realizing the future potential of these young lifesavers, Mike Malherbe (Radio Officer) for passing on his communications skills and those who assisted with water safety.

Congratulations to Madison Agnew, Abby Bailey, Mia Corliss, Marc Ezzeddine, Sebastian Gibbs, Gus Hoefsloot, Kiara Manning, Elliot Mithieux, Sabina Rogers, Grace Shields, Max Smit and Laila Waters

Treasurers Report

A surplus of \$8,955 was recorded for the 2018-19 year after factoring in depreciation expenses.

Income - \$179,171, an increase of almost \$51,000 compared to 2017-18.

Expenditure - \$170,215, an increase of \$40,000 compared to 2017-18.

Highlights:

- \$55,588 received from donations and fundraising activities.
- \$28,627 received from Government grants
- \$67,248 was expended on asset renewals. including acquisition of a new surfboat, two IRB hulls, an IRB motor, a fuel storage cabinet and workshop equipment for IRBs and ATV.

Financial Position

Cash at bank at 31.03.2019 was \$71,261. \$53,536 of this amount was committed for payment after 01.04.2019, and as noted below, was accrued to the 2019-20 financial year, reducing the value of net cash holdings to \$17,725.

Funds accrued - \$21,875 transferred from the Building fund to pay part cost of the building acoustic project, \$9,000 to pay half cost of the ATV, \$8,808 unspent donations, \$7,134 membership levies, and \$6,719 for other invoices payable in 2019-20.

At 31.03.2019, the Club was not in debt to any supplier (other than within 30 day trading terms). As at 30.06.2019, this statement was still valid.

Government grants

- \$14,300: NSW Government Community Building Partnership, enabled purchase of a new IRB hull.
- \$5,000: Australian Government Beach Safety Equipment fund, part cost of ATV.
- \$5,000: NSW Government Volunteering, for patrol member uniforms and protective equipment and other lifesaving activities.
- \$2,682: Wollongong City Council, annual grant for lifesaving patrol operations.
- \$1,645: NSW Government Lifesaving Equipment Grant, fuel storage cabinet.

A grant of \$62,875 from the NSW Government was received through the Surf Club Facility Development Program to improve acoustics in the Club building. This funding will be received in the 2019-20 financial year as work progresses.

NSW Government Active Kids Scheme

The Club registered as an Active Kids Provider and became eligible to accept \$100 Vouchers issued by the NSW Government to parents of school children for payment of membership and registration fees.

24 vouchers totalling \$2,114 were redeemed through the Club for the 2018 calendar year.

Finance

Financial Management

Expenditure and procurement policies were updated during the year with prior authority for expenditure now required from the Executive Committee member responsible for the section/activity concerned, and for expenditure of a non-recurrent nature in excess of \$500, prior approval by the Executive Committee.

Expenditure delegations were issued to Executive Committee Officers to authorise expenditure, and to the Treasurer and finance officers to pay accounts in accordance with the above approval process.

MYOB accounting software continued to be used to manage accounts on a whole-of-Club basis. Business Activity Statements (GST) were similarly submitted on a whole-of-Club basis.

Two bank accounts are in operation, one primarily for all transactions other than Winter Swimming transactions, and the second for Winter Swimming transactions. Excess income and Building Improvement funds are held in Term Deposits.

Accounts were generally paid by EFT, with low cost purchases paid by Club debit cards issued to five Club officers. Winter Swimming accounts were paid by cheque. Direct debit arrangements are in existence with regular suppliers.

The Chart of Accounts (Cost Centres) was amended prior to the start of the 2016-17 Financial Year and brought in line with the National Standard Chart of Accounts for Not-for-Profit organisations issued by ACNC. Some minor changes to facilitate Club reporting have been introduced.

Monthly Finance Reports were tabled at Executive Committee meetings listing individual payments for approval, and a summary of income received.

Financial Statements and Audit of Accounts

Since 2009, the Financial Statements have been prepared in accordance with various Australian Accounting Standards as General Purpose Financial Reports. This has been over and above our obligations as a not-for-profit organisation to meet the reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporations Act (NSW) 1984 and the Charitable Fundraising Act (NSW) 1991.

The Financial Statements this year have been prepared as a Special Purpose Financial Report that will meet the above reporting requirements.

The accounts were again audited by Paul Mattock, of Evolve Small Business Accounting, Coledale. The

Auditors report can be found within the Financial Statements.

Explanatory Notes

The financial year under review is from 01.04.2018 to 31.03.2019.

All income and expenditure recorded in the Financial Statements and throughout this Annual Report, is shown as net amounts exclusive of GST collected, or GST paid, where applicable.

Club overheads including building utility and operational expenses, affiliation and administrative expenses, and membership levies, are apportioned across the whole Club on an approximate membership pro-rata basis, this year 2/3rd seniors and 1/3rd Junior Activities.

Income and Expenditure Statements for individual sections of the Club are included in the Financial Statements.

Club/senior section

A deficit of \$14,496 was recorded.

Total income increased by \$67,889 compared to 2017-18. Income from donations and fundraising increased by \$29,888 to \$55,588 (plus a further \$9,000 accrued from 2017-18), and Government grants by \$9,769 to \$28,627.

\$67,248 was expended on new assets and asset renewals.

\$1,500 was spent to obtain advice on acoustic treatment options, and \$9,660 on design concepts and preparation of plans and specifications. \$9,724 was transferred from the Building Fund this year to partly cover this expense.

The boat section continued its objective towards, as far as practicable, becoming self-supportive raising \$16,500 in donations from Westfund Health Insurance, Peabody Energy Metropolitan Mine and CFMEU Helensburgh Lodge. From other fundraising activities, the boaties contributed a further \$6,000 towards the surf boat and boat trailer acquisitions. A personal donation from Boat Captain Ed White minimised expenditure from Club funds on boat rowing activities, thanks Ed.

The IRB racing team likewise commenced to become self-supportive raising \$3,556 in donations from Helensburgh Hotel and Webbers Carpet Warehouse, as well as other income from Friday evening drinks.

Thanks to Will Canavan for continuing to provide space at his Helensburgh property for storage of the surf boats (stored in shipping containers), and the gear trailer.

\$5,132 was received from hire of the Club premises for private functions and yoga classes.

The bar was open on Sundays for winter swimming activities, and on various Sundays during the summer months after point score. Friday BBQ and drinks were run once a month from October to March with local residents welcome to join Club members for a social evening. Bar income was also received through hire of the Club premises for private functions.

Bar prices were increased on from 1 April 2019. Net bar surplus for 2018-19 was \$12,342.90, with 50% being transferred to the Building Fund.

The temporary loan of funds from the Building Fund to print the 100 year History Book, was finalised with transfer of \$3,550.36 from seniors income to the Building Fund.

Value of saleable stock on hand at 31.03.2019 totalled \$8,207 - bar stock \$3,754, clothing stock \$1,917, and history books \$2,536

Junior Activities

A surplus of \$1,786 was recorded.

Fundraising activities generated income of \$2,566, \$1,215 from the annual Christmas raffle and \$1,030 from Santa Photos on the beach. A further \$1,800 was raised from refreshment sales on Sunday mornings.

Thank you to parents for supporting these activities and for contributing \$3,307 towards re-imbusement of carnival entry fees paid by the Club. In acknowledgement of parents support, the Junior Activities Committee this year decided to waive the usual charge for Christmas Breakfast on the Beach.

Clothing stock on hand at 31.03.2019 was valued at \$7,727.

Winter Swimming

A deficit of \$34 was recorded.

Fund raising income totalled \$2,707, the majority of this being personal contributions by Sea Eels members.

This year the Sea Eels donated \$2,000 to Cram House Foundation.

\$300 was also donated towards Club activities, and \$300 to Coalcliff SLSC.

Clothing stock on hand at 31.03.2018 was valued at \$1,492.

Building Improvement Fund

Bank interest (\$5,895), half bar surplus (\$6,174), and final repayment of the loan for printing the history book (\$3,556) was added during the year.

\$9,725 was transferred to the Operating Account to cover expenses incurred for development of an acoustic treatment plan and preliminary design expenses, and \$20,000 was transferred into a separate Term Deposit and labelled as the Building Contingency Fund.

At 31.03.2019, the Building Fund balance was \$123,424, this amount being invested in two Term Deposits.

Establishment of Building Contingency Fund

During the year, the Club entered into a 21-year lease of the building from Wollongong City Council.

In addition to responsibilities for maintaining the interior of the building, the lease provides that the Club will reinstate at its cost any minor damage to the building that is less than \$20,000 to repair.

A Contingency Fund of \$20,000 has been established to manage this obligation, with the funds being held in a separate Term Deposit.

Appreciation

Thank you to Therese Weber, Secretary and Todd Andrews, Treasurer and other Junior Activities officers and parents who assisted with membership renewals, clothing sales and the collection and receipting of income during the year.

Allison Luck again took control of updating membership records in Surfguard - thanks Allison.

Thanks to Terry Wood who as Sea Eels Treasurer, managed receipt of all income, payments and banking associated with winter swimming activities.

Special thanks to Kevin and Leisa Thomson who have kept the bar well stocked and spent many hours behind the bar this year offering great friendly service, something we all appreciate. Thanks to other RSA holders who helped out behind the bar during the year.

Powercraft Captains annual report 2018-2019

It has been a very busy year for the IRB area. The club introduced 2 new Hulls, 3 new IRB crews, 6 new IRB Drivers, multiple search and rescue incidents and the Sea Wolves IRB racing team entered its second year of competition.

Anthony Ashley took the reins as Powercraft Captain for his second season and we welcomed Mat Webber as the Vice Powercraft Captain.

On Sunday 23rd December 2018 the club christened It's 13th IRB hull naming it "Tanya Potter"

Tanya Potter has the honour of being the club's first female Bronze Medallion holder of the club and is now the first female to have her name on an IRB Hull.

This was a special event as for the first time in the club's history the christening involved 1 IRB hull named after Tanya Potter and 1 Surf Boat named after Graham "Cookie" Cook the event held around 100 members, family and friends on the lawn of Helensburgh - Stanwell Park SLSC. In the crowd were 17 of the 26 Lifetime living members.

Tanya joined the club in the mid- 1970's. During her acceptance speech Tanya recalled the days of mishap or malfunction in the IRBs often being left out the back of the surf waiting for someone to come pick her up.

The new Milpro hull was driven by Anthony Ashley (Powercraft Captain) and Crewed by Guy Ezzedine

On February 24th the club christened this 14th IRB hull naming it Mark "Thommo" Thomson.

Mark celebrated the christening at Helensburgh - Stanwell Park SLSC with his wife Katrina and 3 sons Daniel, Nathan and Adam along with their family and 50 other club members and special guest.

Mark joined the club as a Nipper in 1967.

Mark was a competitor on the beach, and was rarely seen in the water unless he was in an IRB. It was fitting that an IRB be named after him as he was a keen IRB Driver and Competitor, even winning a number of branch medals.

The new IRB a Thundercat Gen III was driven by Matthew Webber (Vice Powercraft Captain) and crewed by Anthony Ashley (Powercraft Captain).

On March 24th 2019 the club gained 6 new IRB Drivers - Tahlia Bailey, Noah Watson, Guy Ezzedine, Aaron Wallace, Matt Anger and Drew Walsh

The club also welcomes in 3 new IRB Crews -



Governance and Affiliation

Governance and Club Management

The Club is an Incorporated Association established under the provisions of the *Associations Incorporations Act* (NSW) 2009.

The Club Constitution and By Laws were last approved by members at the 2017 Annual general Meeting.

Executive Committee

With introduction of the revised Constitution, the Club's affairs are now controlled by the Executive Committee of eight elected officers. Sub-committees including the Lifesaving Committee, Education Committee, Junior Activities Committee, Surf Sports Committee, Winter Swim Committee report to the Executive Committee.

Special General Meetings

A Special General Meeting to elect the Junior Activities Committee and officers for the 2019-20 season was held on 28.04.2019.

Junior Activities Committee

The Junior Activities Committee dealt with day-to-day matters autonomously and held regular meetings during 2018-19 year.

Stanwell Park Sea Eels

Stanwell Park Sea Eels sub-committee dealt with day-to-day matters autonomously and convened meetings as required.

The Sea Eels sub-committee for 2019-20 was elected at a meeting of Club members on 28 April 2019.

Objects of the Club

The Objects of the Club are to:

- (a) Provide for the conduct, encouragement, promotion and administration of surf lifesaving;
- (b) Participate as a Member of Surf Life Saving Illawarra, Surf Life Saving New South Wales and Surf Life Saving Australia through and by which surf lifesaving and the preservation of life in the aquatic environment can be conducted, encouraged, promoted, advanced and administered;

- (c) At all times act on behalf of and in the interest of the Members and surf lifesaving;
- (d) Affiliate with and otherwise liaise with SLSI, SLSNSW and SLSA in the pursuit of these Objects and surf lifesaving;
- (e) Promote the involvement and influence of surf lifesaving standards, techniques, awards and education with bodies involved in lifesaving;
- (f) Prepare junior members for admittance as surf lifesavers;
- (g) Promote competition at Club and inter-club level for junior and senior members;
- (h) Review and/or determine any matters relating to surf lifesaving which may arise, or be referred to it, by any Member;
- (i) Pursue through itself or other such commercial arrangements (which are not in conflict with other SLS bodies), including sponsorship and marketing opportunities as are appropriate to further the interests of surf lifesaving;
- (j) Represent the interests of its Members and of surf lifesaving generally in any appropriate forum;
- (k) Have regard to the public interest in its operations;
- (l) Undertake and/or do all such things or activities which are necessary, incidental or conducive to the advancement of these Objects.

Affiliation with SLSA

Members at the Annual General Meeting on 22 July 2018 resolved to apply for continuing affiliation with Surf Life Saving Australia for the 2018-19 year with a formal application submitted on 2 September 2018

Audit of Accounts 2018-19

The Financial Statements for the 12 months ended 31.03.2019 were approved and signed-off at the Executive Committee meeting on 04.07.2019, following completion of the audit by Paul Mattock of Evolve Small Business Accounting. The Financial Statements and Auditors Report are reprinted towards the end of this Annual Report.

Financial Reporting 2017-18 year

The Financial Statements for year ending 31.03.2018 including Auditors Report, were published in the 2017-18 Annual Report.

The Club is obligated by Commonwealth and State legislation to submit details of its financial activities to the NSW Fair Trading Office and the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission (ACNC).

NSW Fair Trading – report form completed and lodged 21.08.2018

ACNC – on-line submission of the Annual Information Statement for 2017-18 was completed on 29.06.2019. The audited 2016-17 Financial Statements were also submitted, and become public documents accessible by visiting the ACNC website.

Charitable Fundraising

As required by the *Charitable Fundraising Act 1991*, the Club is required to submit an audited Financial Report covering its operations each year, together with a signed declaration of compliance with the Act.

This obligation is met by forwarding a copy of the audited Financial Statements to Surf Life Saving NSW, which holds the 'Authority to Fundraise' on behalf of all NSW surf clubs. The Financial Statements for 2017-18 were submitted on 28.09.2018.

GST reporting

Business Activity Statements were submitted to the Australian Taxation Office at the end of each quarter, the last Statement being submitted on 01.04.2019.

Working with Children Checks

The Club Executive has continued to pursue with individual Club Officers and members who have some association as part of their surf club activities with children under the age of 18 years and obtain an appropriate clearance under the *Child Protection (Working with Children) Act 2012*, and *Child Protection (Working with Children) Regulation, 2013*. At 30 June 2019, 17 members were recorded with a current WWCC clearance.

SLSA Member Protection Policy

In addition to WWCC, members are required to complete a Member Protection Declaration form when they join a surf life saving club.

Insurance

Surf Life Saving Australia has arranged insurance coverage for all surf life saving clubs and entities covering public liability and property loss and damage through brokers Jardine Lloyd Thompson Pty Ltd. Each club is responsible for finalising its own coverage requirements and payment of premium direct to the broker.

The policy includes Public Liability Insurance to the amount of \$50 million, with the Certificate of Currency valid to 07.10.2019.

Insurance policies are current to 01.10.2019 for loss or damage by theft, fire, storm, etc of all Club equipment, motor vehicle insurance for the ATV, boat trailers and board trailer, as well as Directors and Officers Insurance.

Members continue to be covered for medical expenses incurred as a result of an injury whilst involved in an approved surf club activity through the NSW government scheme for volunteer workers.

Environmental management

Refuelling of IRBs and the ATV within the boat shed and paved outdoor area is the main environmental risk during Club activities. Similar to previous years, the risk continued to be mitigated by the availability of a spill kit located in the boat shed, and briefing of IRB crews and patrol members on their duty of care when refuelling. The fuel storage cabinet was replaced during the year.

Liquor Licence

The Club continues to hold an On-Premises Liquor Licence for Stanwell Park Surf Club (LIQO 660031060). OLGR approved Harley Dreghorn being appointed as Manager from 06.09.2017.

No incidents relating to the Liquor Licence were recorded during the year.

Motor Vehicle Registration

Motor vehicle registration is current for two surf boat trailers, and the gear trailer and 2 ATVs.

Statutory and other Obligations

Membership overview

Total membership was 446 compared to 442 in 2017-18 year – refer Membership statistics elsewhere in this report.

Representation at Branch, State and Australian level

The following members were involved in surf life saving activities at Branch, State or Australian level

Communication with members was managed through the website, Facebook, and regular email and SMS messages through Surfguard.

Notification of the Annual General Meeting and the election of officers, and membership renewal was emailed to members on 07.06.2019 and posted to members during July 2019,.

Club Building and Assets

Club building – lease

Wollongong City Council approved a lease of the Club building for a term of 21 years at its meeting on 28 October 2018. The lease document was approved and executed at the Executive Committee meeting held on 5 February 2019. The lease term commenced on 1 November 2018 and terminates on 31 October 2039.

Building maintenance works

Wollongong City Council undertook repairs to sealing of the southern wall windows to prevent rainwater penetration during March, and subsequently resealing of the parquet dance floor as a result of water damage in May 2019.

Club building – acoustic treatment

Design plans for acoustic treatment works as recommended by an acoustics consultant were completed in June 2018 by former member Michelle Viret from Inbuilt Pty Ltd with additional works included to improve presentation of the main hall area. Tenders were invited on 8 October 2018 with offers received from three building contractors. A contract was subsequently awarded to Innocon Pty Ltd, with work to be completed by the end of June 2019. The work includes:

- replacement of the plasterboard ceiling above the main hall and dance floor, with structural beams boxed in.
- attachment of acoustic panels to the ceiling, and northern wall (dance floor end)
- storage cupboards at the western end for chairs and other equipment.
- LED lighting throughout and repainting.

Club building – future improvements.

Club member Brett Sherson approached the Club during the year with an offer to donate his architectural services to bring the Club building up to accessibility standards and redesign some areas to make better use of available space.

The Executive Committee approved a design concept in April 2019. Brett and some fellow architects will now develop final design plans, following which the Club will lodge a DA to install accessible facilities including lift access to the upper level, and seek access to the western balcony.

Once the DA has been approved, the Club will be in a position to apply for further funding under the NSW Government Surf Club Facility Grant Program to undertake this work.

Asset Register

A summary list of Club assets is included at the end of this report. Detailed information about the more significant assets including IRBs, ATV, surf boats, and lifesaving equipment is also contained in the SLSA Surfguard database.

IRB lifting frame was upgraded.

Notes to the Financial Statements

Helensburgh-Stanwell Park Surf Life Saving Club Incorporated is an association incorporated in NSW under the *Associations Incorporation Act (NSW) 2009*.

This Financial Report covers all operations and activities of the Association ("the Club") including all sub-groups, as an individual entity.

1 Basis of Preparation

The Financial Report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the *Associations Incorporation Act (NSW) 2009*, the *Charitable Fundraising Act (NSW) 1991*, and the *Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act (Cth) 2012* and Regulations under those Acts. The Committee has determined that the Association is not a reporting entity.

The Financial Report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs, modified where applicable by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets, and financial liabilities.

(i) Income Tax

The Association is exempt from payment of Income Tax under Division 51, Section 50-10 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act, 1997*.

Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

(ii) Property, Plant and Equipment

The Association does not own any real property.

Each class of property, plant and equipment valued at more than \$1,000 at the date of this report, is carried at cost or fair value as indicated less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

2 Financial Instruments

(i) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

(ii) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office.

(iii) Comparative Figures

This report is for the 12 month period commencing 1 April 2018 and ending 31 March 2019, with comparative figures for the 12 months ended 31 March 2018.

3 Building Lease Contingency Fund

The Association occupies the Stanwell Park Surf Club premises under a lease from Wollongong City Council. A condition of the lease obligates the Association to make good at its cost minor damage to the building up to an amount of \$20,000. The Association has accordingly set aside an amount of \$20,000 to meet this obligation should damage occur.

4 Building Fund Term Deposits

Funds held in two Term Deposits have been raised for and are allocated to future extensions and upgrading of the Club building.


